PART I BRIEF SUMMARY.

- A. TU 31.3.3 (THIRD Fleet Naval Landing Force) commenced landing on Green Beach, YOKOSUKA Naval Base, at 1037 Item, 30 August 1945, as a part of the TOKYO Occupation Force, set up bivouac areas, stationed guards as directed and continued to function as a guard, police and patrol unit until relieved on 5 September 1945 by personnel of TU 31.3.21.

PART II PRELIMINARIES.

- A. Task Unit 31.3.3 (THIRD Fleet Naval Landing Force) was formed in compliance with the provisions of CTF Op Plan CTF31 No. 1-45 for the purpose of participating in the initial landings incident to the occupation of TOKYO. The Task Unit consisted of a Naval Landing Force Regiment of 60 officers and 818 men taken from eight battleships of Battleship Squadron TWO and was organized as a regimental headquarters and two amphibious assault battalions. 4 officer interpreters from JICPOA were also attached as were eight nucleus crew units which were formed from ships of Task Force 38 for the purpose of securing and operating enemy vessels in commission. The nucleus crew personnel totalled 15 officers and 253 men.

This landing force was assigned to and operated under the Commander Task Group 31.3 (The Commander THIRD Fleet Landing Force - Brigadier General William T. CLEMENT, U. S. Marine Corps). Other units of Task Group 31.3 which participated jointly in this operation were Task Unit 31.3.1 (4th Marine Regiment (reinf), 6th Marine Division); Task Unit 31.3.2 (THIRD Fleet Marine Landing Force); and Task Unit 31.3.4 (British Landing Force). Task Group 31.3 was one of many groups which operated under the Commander Task Force 31 (The Commander TOKYO Occupation Force - Rear Admiral Oscar C. BADGER, U. S. Navy - The Commander Battleship Division SEVEN).

- B. The operations of the unit from the time of debarkation from parent ships up to the day of landing were, by necessity, restricted due to the limitations of space in the troop transport. The preliminary organization and administrative directive are incorporated in Appendix I - Copy of Operation Plan CTU 31.3.3 No. 1-45. Essential briefing for officers and men prior to debarkation is covered in Appendix II - Copy of Navy Regimental Order No. 1-45.
- C. Details of the organization of the THIRD Fleet Naval Landing Force and comprehensive reports of its routine and activities are contained in Part III - Chronological account of the action.

The mission of Task Unit 31.3.3, as covered in Appendix III - Copy of Operation Order CTU 31.3.3 No. 1-45 derived from CTG 31.3 Op Plan No. 1-45 (Preferred), was to land on designated beach in YOKOSUKA Navy

PART II PRELIMINARIES (Continued).

Yard following initial landings by Task Unit 31.3.1, to relieve elements of the 4th Marines (reinf) in occupation of the Navy Yard and to provide the necessary security for that area. A further mission was to place nucleus crews aboard and assume control of designated operational Japanese vessels. The primary mission was accomplished successfully as planned and without untoward incident. Prior to the landing, the Commander Task Force 31, under the direction of the Commander THIRD Fleet, placed nucleus crew aboard the Japanese battleship NAGATO. This crew demilitarized the ship and thereby prevented its interference with the scheduled landings. Five nucleus crews landed with the assault battalion of Task Group 31.3.3 and were utilized to good advantage as reinforcements since no further requirement for nucleus crews arose.

- D. The landing and occupation took place on 30 August 1945 (East Longitude Date). Task Unit 31.3.3 debarked expeditiously from U.S.S. MONITOR (LSV-5) and U.S.S. RUNELS (APD 85). HOW hour was 0930 I. The first wave of the Task Unit landed at an Eastern Beach of YOKOSUKA Navy Yard at 1037 I. Three scheduled successive waves landed in good order shortly thereafter and the final wave, containing cargo, was ordered in during the afternoon and landed at 1600 I. Relieving of the Marine positions was commenced at 1430 I, the same day, and by dark the occupation of approximately the Northeast half of the Navy Yard was completed by Task Unit 31.3.3. A minor adjustment of the boundary between the areas of responsibility of this unit and the 4th Marines was effected on 31 August and thereafter the occupation proceeded without notable event. Detachments, grouped by parent vessels, were detached from the Landing Force and returned to their ships from time to time during the occupation as circumstances dictated. On 4 September the 4th Marines (reinf) commenced taking over the security of the area as more Navy units were detached. Remaining units of Task Unit 31.3.3 were ordered to return to their ships on 5 September 1945, thus concluding the operation for this command.
- E. Cooperation and docility of the Japanese was satisfactory. Only minor numbers of Japanese were encountered by this command.

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PART III CHRONOLOGICAL ACCOUNT OF THE ACTION.

A.

20 August 1945

Based on ComTHIRD Fleet Op Plan 10-45, ComTaskForce 31 Op Plan 1-45, and ComTask Group 31.3 Op Plan 1-45, Task Unit 31.3.3 (THIRD Fleet Naval Landing Force), Cmdr. L.T. MALONE, USN, OTC and CTU began to assemble on the MONITOR (LSV-5). The landing force totalled 64 officers and 818 men, a grand total of 882 which was divided as follows:

The first Company came aboard the MONITOR at 1300 from the WISCONSIN. At 1500 the MISSOURI Company arrived aboard via the IOWA, both contingents carried standard Naval Landing Force Equipment, heavy marching order, weapons and rations for three days.

21 August 1945

The Regimental Commander and his Executive Officer attended a forenoon conference with CTG 31.3 (Brig. Gen. Clement) in USS GRIMES. Officers and men from the NORTH CAROLINA, SOUTH DAKOTA, and INDIANA, who were being staged via the WANTUCK (APD-125), embarked during the morning. In the afternoon the ALABAMA company came aboard from the REEVES (APD-52). The MASSACHUSETTS and INDIANA Companies arrived via the GOSSELIN (APD-126) but did not complete the transfer by sunset and were ordered to continue transfer at sunrise. The Regimental Commander called a conference of all officers after evening meal and explained the plans for the occupation of YOKOSUKA Naval Base, stressing the fact that the landing force was to "occupy" and not "invade". Strict orders for training the landing force while on board were also given.

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PART III CHRONOLOGICAL ACCOUNT OF THE ACTION.

22 August 1945:

The GOSSELIN completed transfer of personnel in the early morning (0600) and the day was spent in training and instructions for the enlisted men by the company officers while the REGIMENTAL STAFF worked on the Operation Order for the occupation.

23 August 1945

Typhus inoculations of all Landing Force personnel by the Ship's medical detail at 0830 preceded the day's program of continued drilling and training which consisted of Squad and Platoon maneuvers, Manual of Arms, handling of small arms, grenade instruction, interior guard duties, field sanitation and hygiene, abandon ship, debarkation, and lectures on duties and responsibilities while occupying YOKOSUKA Naval Yard. Lieutenant (jg) G. T. ROMANI, S(I), USNR, was transferred this date.

24, 25, 26 and 27 August 1945

Preparations, planning, drilling, and training continued throughout this period. Officers and men alike seemed impressed with their responsibilities and the landing force began to take on a more efficient appearance. At 1715 the MONITOR dropped anchor in SAGAMI WAN 1200 yards southwest of the town of SHINJISE to await final orders to proceed around SAGAMI Peninsula towards YOKOSUKA.

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PART III CHRONOLOGICAL ACCOUNT OF THE ACTION.

28, 29 August 1945

U.S.S. MONITOR remained at anchor in SAGAMI WAN. The Regiment continued with the training program. The Regimental Commander and the Operations Officer attended a conference on the USS OZARK (LSV2) the morning of the 28th and on the morning of the 29th the Regimental Commander and part of the Staff attended a conference on the USS GRIMES (APA 172) wherein the Commanding General set forth the final plan for the occupation of YOKOSUKA Naval Base.

30 August 1945

USS MONITOR departed SAGAMI WAN at 0300 for assigned debarkation anchorage off YOKOSUKA Naval Base arriving at 0906. HOW hour was changed to 0930. Landing craft were put in the water and loaded without incident. The first wave landed at Green Beach south of the officers' barracks at 1037. There was no Japanese opposition of any kind and all four waves made the beach on schedule. The 3rd Battalion consisting of Nucleus Crews, which had been billeted on the USS RUNELS (APD-85) were landed at this time. It consisted of 8 officers and 166 men, representing the below named ships as follows:

Quarters were set up in the Naval Gunnery School building at YOKOSUKA Naval Base. At 1345 the American Flag was raised with appropriate ceremonies and at 1430 guard duties were taken over from the Marines as ordered. Area of responsibility assigned and taken over at this time was the area North and East of the Line A-B (See Appendix IV). Additional sentries were posted wherever it was considered necessary.

Lt. Commander HIRATSUKA, Japanese Navy, former instructor at the Japanese Naval Gunnery School, was assigned to Regimental Headquarters as interpreter and guide.

Communications were excellent with TBX, TBY, and SCR-300 functioning properly. In the late afternoon field telephones were set up and communications with Landing Force Headquarters established. The Navy Yard electrical and water systems were found to be functioning properly.

Three days battle rations were carried by the men. Drinking water was also brought ashore.

The Ordnance and Bomb Disposal Groups from TG 38.1, consisting of 9 officers and 70 men, reported to CTU 31.3.3 and were quartered with the Regiment pending further instructions.

All areas had been previously cleared of Japanese personnel except police, essential civilians and military personnel used as guides, interpreters, drivers, and guards, as demanded from Japanese Authorities. Cooperation was satisfactory.

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PART III CHRONOLOGICAL ACCOUNT OF THE ACTION (Continued).

31 AUGUST 1945 The desired routine for the Regiment became firm, and time was spent in improving the bivouac area without detriment to the assigned mission. Preliminary investigation of the area under control of the Landing Force revealed that everything of military importance that could be easily lifted had been removed. The warehouses contained articles of minor value, such as old rifles and bayonets, navigation equipment, blankets, netting, textbooks, etc., most of which was in poor condition. The articles were left intact, under guard, to be turned over to organized processing and intelligence teams. The hills were found to be honeycombed with caves and tunnels. Some were air raid shelters, others were equipped with heavy machine tools, and one was found to have a radio station apparently in working order. Another tunnel was set up for the construction of midget submarines, with parts of one in fabrication. A tunnel facing the causeway where the NAGATO had been tied up was found to contain the 16" powder hastily moved there from the NAGATO before she was moored in the stream. Five salute-conscious Japanese sailors, assigned by the Commanding Officer of the NAGATO, were on guard but were immediately replaced by American bluejackets and the demolition company informed, who in turn took charge.

It has been impossible to catalog equipment, as personnel were all on guard duty. Equipment was left intact, under guard, for JICPOA processing team to take over that work.

Some reports of removal of equipment have been received. In some cases this was reported to be by men from ships and small craft in the harbor. Every effort was made to prevent it. There were no cases of looters actually apprehended in the area, and it is probable that most reports were based on observation of evidence that items had been hastily removed presumably by the Japanese.

At 1300 a working party of 50 hands, 10 petty officers and 2 officers was called to assist in unloading Task Force supplies on the beach. This work continued through most of the night and a relief party was sent at 2100.

Throughout the day information was collected on the situation within assigned areas of responsibility and reports were commenced on the location and identity of arms, ammunition and equipment.

In compliance with orders from Landing Force Headquarters, changing the boundary of responsibility, relief of and by Marines was accomplished during the afternoon to conform to the new line C-D (See Appendix A).

1 SEPTEMBER 1945 The chief function of this Task Unit continued to be guard, police and patrol. At 0800 the MASSACHUSETTS company, totalling 5 officers and 133 men, was detached for return to USS MASSACHUSETTS in compliance with orders of CTF 31.

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PART III CHRONOLOGICAL ACCOUNT OF THE ACTION (Continued).

Lieutenant Commander HIRATSUKA, A Japanese Navy, (Interpreter assigned to Regimental Headquarters) was dismissed at 1400 after being informed his services were no longer required.

G-4 requested a grid location on all arms and minitions in the area that could be transported by truck. This equipment will be moved by Marine trucks to a central dump, inventoried, and reported to Naval Shore Activities Headquarters.

At 1600, 99 men and 6 officers, members of nucleus crews from the U.S.S. NORTH CAROLINA, were transferred from TU 31.3.3 to TG 31.7 (Naval Shore Activities) for temporary duty.

An overlay was made from a Japanese chart of the Naval Gunnery School area, showing all military installations, including caves, tunnels and warehouses and their contents. This overlay was forwarded to Naval Landing Force Headquarters.

Late in the evening word was received from Naval Landing Force Headquarters that this unit would not be required to furnish further working parties at the unloading beach.

At 2200 a new post was set up at the request of Landing Force Headquarters to guard the Landing Force Ammunition Dump.

Lieutenant (jg) E. T. ROMANI, S(I), USNR, reported this date, having completed temporary duty with CTU 31.3.1.

2 SEPTEMBER 1945 At 0600 the Ordnance and Bomb Disposal Groups (9 officers and 70 men) heretofore quartered with the Regiment departed and reported to CTG 31.7 (The Commander Naval Shore Activities) for duty. Shortly thereafter they were observed removing NAGATO powder for final disposition. In addition to guard duties, the day was spent checking the base for locations of concentrations and stock piles of light equipment such as small arms, small arms ammunition, optical equipment, navigation equipment and other related items.

Careful investigation by the Regimental Commander and his Staff established that in general all locations of light equipment had been removed, probably by the Japanese prior to the time their security passed to the THIRD Fleet Naval Landing Force. Wherever stockpiles were discovered, adequate guards were posted and the physical security is now considered satisfactory.

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PART III CHRONOLOGICAL ACCOUNT OF THE ACTION.

3 September 1945

Routine sentry duty was continued throughout the day. High performance of duty of sentries was reflected by the numerous instances in which personnel of other activities were escorted to Headquarters for interview before being passed into the area. A Regimental Ammunition Dump was established in Building 32. At 1500 the Regiment less personnel on duty was formed on the Parade Ground for a talk by the Regimental Commander.

4 September 1945

At 0800 the MISSOURI Company, 12 officers and 199 men, and the SOUTH DAKOTA Detachment, 2 officers and 7 men, were detached for return to their respective ships in compliance with orders of CTF 31. The four language officers were also detached to report to CTF 31.

During the day the Fourth Marine (reinforced) Regiment took over guard duties from the THIRD Fleet Naval Landing Force. The officers and men of the Landing Force remaining on shore made preparations for embarking for return to their respective ships as transportation was made available.

- B. The weather was, in general, favorable during the at sea period and full advantage was taken for topside training under arms as the restricted deck space permitted. The weather was excellent on the day of landing and all equipment and stores dumps were shifted to suitable stowage during clear weather. Intermittent rain during the second and third day after landing made sentry duty disagreeable, however, all personnel was well equipped with ponchos and helmets and efficiency was not particularly effected by inclement weather.

7. MEDICAL REPORT.

Upon landing at 1037, 30 August 1945, at Green Beach, YOKOSUKA Navy Yard, the regiment was marched to the bivouac area. Prior to occupancy of quarters assigned in the Gunnery School barracks and headquarters buildings, inspection was made by the Regimental Commander and the Regimental Surgeon. Thorough cleaning and spraying with DDT were effected immediately. Conditions as to cleanliness and insect infestation in the barracks were then found to be satisfactory and occupation was affected forthwith.

Head facilities already existing were appraised and suitable heads were designated for cleaning and disinfection with cresol. Unsuitable heads were closed and boarded up.

Fresh water supply was from canteens, portable drinking fountains and breakers filled in transports prior to landing. This supply was replenished as needed from U.S. ships lying offshore and from the 4th Regiment of the 6th Marine Division. Use of water or food from sources other than the U.S. Navy or Marine Corps had been forbidden by previous Regimental Order.

The men were billeted in clean hammocks supplied by the Japanese. These were inspected by the Regimental Commander and the Regimental Surgeon. Each hammock was supplied with a clean mosquito net. There were no fly screens in any of the buildings occupied by our forces.

Japanese cook and bath houses adjoining the barracks were inspected, found to be in a filthy condition, unsuitable for use, and were condemned.

Messing was by "K" and "10 in 1" rations for the first three days. On the fourth day a regimental mess hall was set up and completed in a nearby building. Suitable scullery, with ample facilities for the sterilization of mess gear, was set up by the Supply Department on the fourth day and thereafter hot meals and coffee were served to the crew from this central source. This was accomplished with the advice and approval of the Medical Department. Each officer and man was given the opportunity, beginning on the fourth day, to have one meal a day aboard the U.S.S. PIEDMONT.

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PART VI SPECIAL COMMENTS AND INFORMATION (Continued).

Garbage, trash, and scullery waste were disposed of by deep burial after thorough spraying with oil and DDT.

The fresh water supply to the Naval Base was chlorinated at its source by the Marine Corps Engineers and, after bacteriological analysis, was found to be suitable for use by the evening of the fifth day.

Numerous artificial pools of water, used for fire-fighting, were found adjacent to the buildings and were excellent breeding places for mosquitoes which were most plentiful in the area. These were sprayed with oil and DDT as an emergency measure. No Anopheles mosquitoes were observed.

The construction of buildings, cleanliness in general, and sanitary facilities were found to be in no way comparable with accepted standards in the U.S. Navy.

PART VII PERSONNEL PERFORMANCE AND CASUALTIES.

As can perhaps be imagined, the complexities and difficulties which stood in the way of forming this organization and insuring the accomplishment of its mission were very considerable. The size and the diversity of the fleet commands charged with providing the Landing Force Regiment, in themselves constituted a serious obstacle to its organization. The entire Fleet was at sea during the planning stage of the operation and remained so until just before the day of landing. This seriously interfered with planning, preparation and administration of the Task Unit once it had been delineated by guard mail and dispatch. The great majority, if not all, of the personnel assigned had had no experience in amphibious warfare. The officers and men selected were, for the most part, personnel who had been undergoing many months of condition-watch steaming in the forward areas. Their discipline had become specialized and only partially suitable to the operation planned. By reason of the general situation obtaining, ships contributing personnel felt it necessary in many cases to fill their quotas with officers and men they could best, rather than least, afford to spare. Landing Force equipment in all ships had long since been greatly reduced in allowance. The Landing Force Manual had become obsolescent. The entire science was found quite naturally to have fallen into disregard within the capital ships.

Fortunately, however, these obstacles to the success of this unusual and significant mission, serious though they were, were admirably countered by the enthusiasm, earnest attention and obedience of the personnel. Especially the bluejackets. These men cannot be praised

too highly for every aspect of their conduct throughout this operation. Ill clothed and ill equipped, untrained and uncomfortable, to a man they put everything they had into present^{ing} a smart, resolute and prideful military performance. It can truly be said that the bluejackets of the THIRD Fleet Naval Landing Force overcame their "dungaree stigma" with flying colors and were a worthy credit to their Navy which they represented.

Throughout the entire period 20 August to 5 September, there were no disciplinary mast cases and none were indicated. Obedience and performance of duty were exemplary. After establishment of patrols, as the many other activities ashore began to operate sending personnel about the Navy Yard, countless examples of our sentries high performance of duty were given each day as officers and men would report their inability to pass the sentry posts without proper credentials. Due to their strict compliance with all sanitary regulations, the health of the personnel was excellent throughout. There were no gunshot or weapon wounds, and no admission to the sick list for anything attributable to the peculiarity of this operation.

PART VIII LESSONS LEARNED, CONCLUSIONS, AND RECOMMENDATIONS.

Happily this landing operation should be the last of its kind for many many years, and should another ever be required, conditions would be so vastly different that any recommendations made here could scarcely apply. It is certain that amphibious operations and armed occupations have been developed far beyond the power of this Task Unit to contribute to their lore. This was a unique operation conducted for unique purposes. It is confidently believed that the indomitable excellence of the American Bluejacket and his officers served to accomplish the mission assigned.

1. GENERAL SITUATION:

Japan has capitulated. United States Forces have entered Tokyo Bay.

ENEMY FORCES

- (a) Seven to eight Army divisions have been reported in the Tokyo Bay Area.
- (b) Recent reports indicate the presence of numerous submarines and human torpedoes in the Sagami Wan Area.
- (c) The air strength of the Tokyo planes is estimated at a total of 3,000 combatant and trainer planes.
- (d) Heavy concentrations of major caliber coast defense batteries are located in the Tokyo Bay Area.
- (e) Booby-Traps may be expected.
- (f) Fanatical individuals or groups may be expected to initiate sneak raids or attacks.
- (g) Indiscriminate sniping may be expected.

- (b) The 4th Marines (Reinforced) and U.S. Army units will have completed initial occupation of areas ashore.

NAVY REGIMENTAL ORDER NO. 1-45.

Subject: Instructions for briefing Officers and Men Prior to
Debarcation from Transports.

1. With cessation of organized hostilities by the enemy, it can be assumed that no defense will be encountered by this landing force. However, the possibilities of treacherous employment of any or all offensive weapons cannot be overlooked, caution must be exercised against possible employment by the enemy of mines and boby-traps in key installations in this area.

2. GENERAL

- 9 02525
- (1) All Japanese military and naval personnel will be disarmed and weapons collected by units concerned.
 - (2) All but a minimum maintenance crew will be removed from all ships and key installations. U. S. Navy maintenance crews will be provided by THIRD Fleet Naval Landing Force.
 - (3) Prisoners will be held until they can be turned over to Naval Shore Activities, YOKOSUKA Area for further disposition.
 - (4) Disarmed Japanese military and naval personnel will be treated with dignity and decorum while in our custody, pending disposition, and will not be subjected to abusive speech or conduct.
 - (5) All POWs and internees of Allied Nations will be transported to YOKOSUKA Naval Base as expeditiously as possible and turned over to Naval Shore Activities, YOKOSUKA Area.
 - (6) Interior guard duty will be conducted in accordance with Naval Landing Force Manual.
 - (7) Utilities, communications and ships will be guarded by members of the landing force only until such time as they are relieved by members of THIRD Fleet Naval Landing Force.
 - (8) All non-essential civilians will be cleared from areas under Naval control.
 - (9) All units will maintain all-around security at night.
 - (10) Pilferage, looting, souvenir hunting, wanton destruction of property and abusive treatment of Japanese will under no circumstances be tolerated. Disciplinary action will be taken in violation of this order.
 - (11) Troops will not enter any buildings except when actually in the performance of duty.
 - (12) The 4th Mar (Reinf) will land tactically in scheduled waves. Remaining units will land by companies, at seven minute intervals.
 - (13) Troops will carry pieces loaded and locked with no round in chamber. They will open fire only when fired upon.

RECONNAISSANCE AND OBSERVATION MISSIONS

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- (1) All units will be prepared to execute special reconnaissance missions as ordered.
- (2) LANDING FORCES — Report the following information as received:
 - (a) Report by most rapid means any and all details of resistance by the enemy, or intentions to resist, or preparations to resist.
 - (b) Location of Land Mines, Booby Traps, Tactical Wire and Road Blocks.
 - (c) Location, type and number of Japanese weapons impounded.

4.

MEASURES FOR HANDLING PRISONERS AND CAPTURED DOCUMENTS:

(1) Military and Civilian Personnel.

- (a) Unit Commanders will avoid dealing with individual Japanese enlisted men. In handling personnel, Unit Commanders will deal directly with the senior Japanese Unit Commander. Where units have no officer in command, the senior non-commissioned officer will be employed.
- (b) Unit Commanders will establish a Retention Center within their respective areas, for handling disarmed Japanese Army and Navy personnel. They will provide adequate guards to maintain the Retention Center.
- (c) Under no circumstances will an officer prisoner be evacuated from the Target Area without this Headquarters being informed, and concurring with, the evacuation of the prisoner.
- (d) Wounded or sick prisoners will be given adequate medical care.
- (e) Unit Commanders should make efforts to centralize into one building, or a single area, Japanese units which surrender their areas under the command of their own officers.

(2) Documents and Impounded Materiel

- (a) Units will report all available information, including Military Documents, Photographs, Charts, Sketches, Equipment, Materials, Maps and Records of every character. So far as practicable, such items are to remain where discovered, and a report as to where they are to be found will be forwarded to this Headquarters. Only those documents of immediate tactical value will be removed.
- (b) No documents, Maps, Photographs or Equipment or Materiel of any kind will be retained as personal souvenirs. Unit Commanders will initiate strict measures for the enforcement of this provision. All personnel will be briefed

- regarding this information before landing.
- (c) Name Plates, Tags and Identification of all Machinery and Equipment will be left intact.
 - (d) Tampering with Japanese equipment of any kind will not be tolerated.
 - (e) Full photographs of equipment, materiel, vessels, and installations of intelligence value will be made. Units will forward requests for photos to this Headquarters.

5. COUNTER INTELLIGENCE

- (1) All personnel will refrain from patronizing and fraternizing with the Japanese. No conversation will be carried on other than those absolutely necessary to the prosecution of military duty.
- (2) All personnel will refrain from expressing their feelings toward, or their opinions of, the Japanese people.

6. REPORTS AND DISTRIBUTION

- (1) Periodic Reports will be submitted daily as of 1600 by 1800.
- (2) Negative Reports will be submitted every six hours.
- (3) Maintenance of all records necessary to properly locate, identify, evaluate and safeguard intelligence information will be made.
- (4) The immediate forwarding of information of operational importance to the United Nations and to this Headquarters will be made to this Headquarters.
- (5) All units will keep up-to-date count of impounded and destroyed equipment.

7. ADMINISTRATIVE:

- (1) Supplies
 - (a) General - Units will establish own dumps initially and shall have previously designated personnel remain with, and guard their dumped stores and equipment.

 - (a) Each officer and man shall be landed with one day's battle ration in his pack.

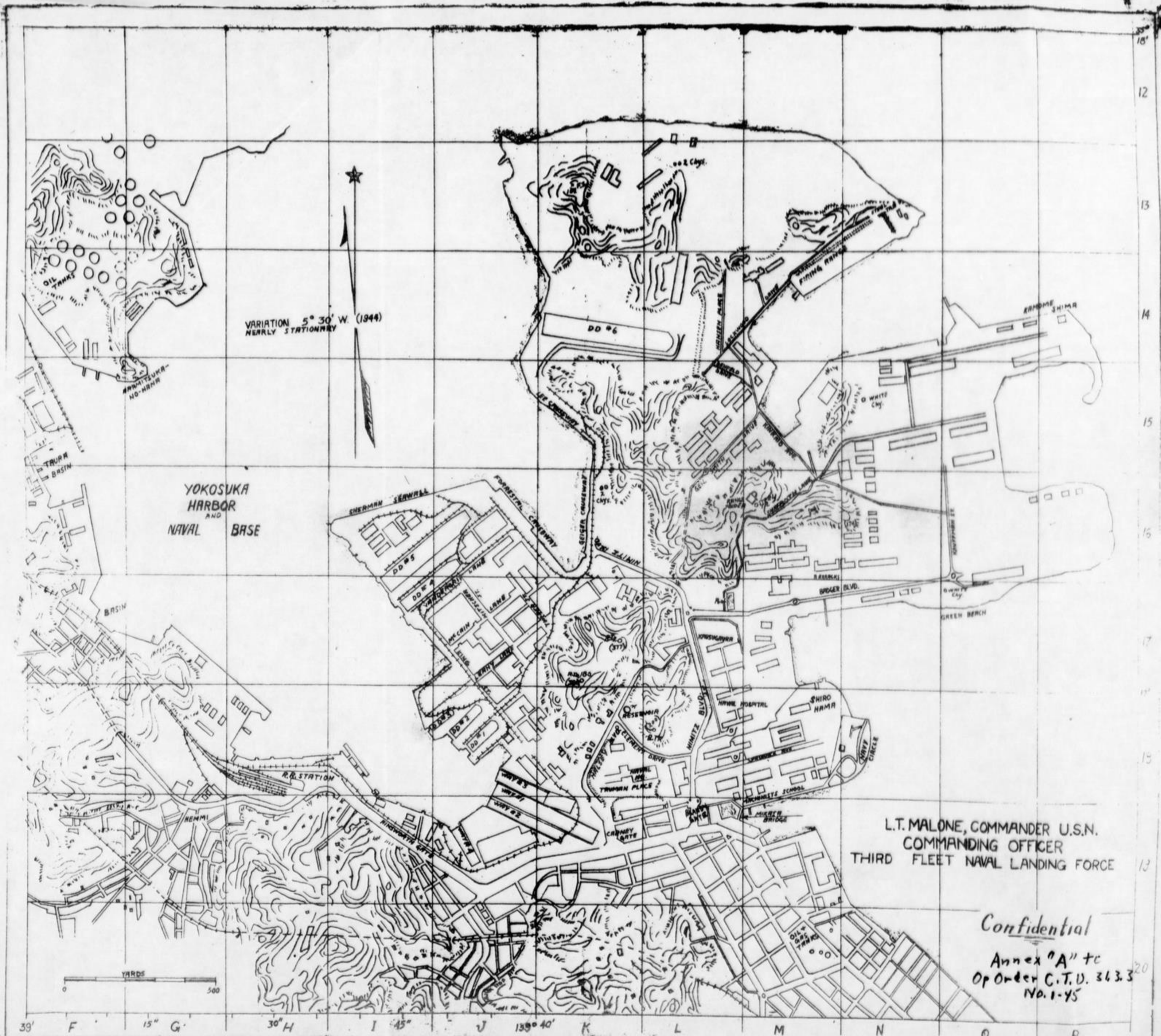

1. SUMMARY OF ENEMY SITUATION

- a. The YOKOSUKA Naval Base is headquarters for the First Naval District, and is the second largest Naval Base in the Japanese Empire. Its dockyards have complete facilities for building and maintenance of all types of naval vessels. There are six dry docks, two of which will accommodate BB's, one for CA's, one for DD's and 2 for PC's.

Headquarters, most of the ordnance and radio experimental shops, barracks, hospitals and naval schools are located on the eastern end of YOKOSUKA Peninsula. Four underground oil storage tanks with aggregate capacity of 7,392,000 gallons are reported south of dry dock #6. The Navy Yard occupies the western part of the peninsula facing YOKOSUKA KO, which has sufficient depth for major vessels. Navigation may be hazardous due to enemy ships sunk in the area and possible unswept mines.

GREEN Beach, the preferred landing area, is a sloping sandy beach facing south on the eastern side of the base. It should offer easy access, if not mined. A road extends along this beach and westward across the peninsula. This road should facilitate quick deployment to all parts of the area as other roads connect with it.

Naval barracks, possibly suitable for immediate occupation, are situated 600 feet inland from the landing area. There is also an athletic field nearby which might be used for a temporary supply dump or internment station. A motor pool is estimated to be about one-half mile to the southwest of GREEN Beach.

While there are few definitely located gun emplacements in this area, it is probable that the base is well fortified with coastal and anti-aircraft guns. It can be assumed that no defense will be encountered although caution must be exercised against possible overlooked mines, booby traps and fanatical Japanese.

- b. Subsequent bulletins and intelligence summaries will be issued by this headquarters.

2. ESSENTIAL ELEMENTS OF INFORMATION

- a. Determine the composition and strength of Japanese forces occupying the YOKOSUKA Naval Station.

3. RECONNAISSANCE AND OBSERVATION MISSIONS

- a. All units will be prepared to execute special reconnaissance missions as ordered.

- b. LANDING FORCES -- Report the following information as received:

- (1) Report by most rapid means any and all details of resistance by the enemy, or intentions to resist, or preparations to resist.
- (2) Location of Land Mines, Booby Traps, Tactical Wire and Road Blocks.
- (3) Location, type and number of Japanese weapons impounded.

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INTELLIGENCE (Cont'd)

- (4) Conditions, type, and width of roads capable of handling heavy vehicular traffic.
- (5) Location and type of Beach Defenses as observed.
- (6) Japanese military and naval unit identifications.

c. SIGNAL--

- (1) Report condition of all communications installations.
- (2) Report, evaluate, and identify all signal material with suitable markers and labels and forward the location to Regimental Headquarters.
- (3) Responsible for signal security.

d. MEDICAL--

- (1) Report to R-2 all pertinent facts concerning any wounded Japanese military personnel received.
- (2) Record, label, and report the location of all medical supplies and any materials of medical intelligence value.
- (3) For disposition and care of repatriates, see Adm Order CTU31.3.3 No. 1-45.

4. MEASURES FOR HANDLING PRISONERS AND CAPTURED DOCUMENTS

a. Military and civilian personnel.

- (1) Unit Commanders will avoid dealing with individual Japanese enlisted men. In handling personnel, Unit Commanders will deal directly with the senior Japanese Unit Commander. Where units have no officer in command, the senior non-commissioned officer will be employed.
- (2) Unit Commander will establish a Retention Center for handling disarmed Japanese Army and Navy personnel. He will provide adequate guards to maintain the Retention Center.
- (3) Under no circumstances will an officer prisoner be evacuated from the Target Area without Regimental Headquarters being informed, and concurring with, the evacuation of the prisoner.
- (4) Wounded or sick prisoners will be given adequate medical care.
- (5) Unit Commanders should make efforts to centralize into one building, or a single area, Japanese units which surrender their areas under the command of their own officers.

b. DOCUMENTS AND IMPOUNDED MATERIEL

- (1) Units will report all available information, including Military Documents, Photographs, Charts, Sketches, Equipment, Materials, Maps and Records of every character. So far as practicable, such items are to remain where discovered, and a report as to where they are to be found will be forwarded to Regimental Headquarters. Only those documents of immediate tactical value will be removed.
- (2) No Documents, Maps, Photographs or Equipment or Materiel of any kind will be retained as personal souvenirs. Unit Commanders will initiate strict measures for the enforcement of this provis-

vision. All personnel will be briefed regarding this information before landing.

- (3) Name Plates, Tags and Identification of all Machinery and Equipment will be left intact.
- (4) Tampering with Japanese equipment of any kind will not be tolerated.
- (5) Full photographs of Equipment, Materiel, Vessels and Installations of intelligence value will be made as conditions warrant. Units will forward requests for photos to Regimental Headquarters.

5. MAPS AND AERIAL PHOTOGRAPHS

- a. Will be furnished on request as available.

6. COUNTER INTELLIGENCE

- a. All personnel will refrain from patronizing and fraternizing with the Japanese. No conversations will be carried on other than those absolutely necessary to the prosecution of military duty.
- b. All personnel will refrain from expressing their feelings toward, or their opinions of, the Japanese people.
- c. Censorship:

- (1) See CTG 31.3 Special Order No. 1-45.

7. PUBLIC INFORMATION

- a. All units will accord to accredited representatives of the Press and Radio every facility practicable. Public information is a Command Responsibility.
- b. Public Information Officers, Combat Correspondents and Photographers will assist and supplement the work of civilian correspondents in accordance with established procedure.
- c. Censorship over Press Releases will be exercised by CINCPAC Press Censors.

8. REPORTS AND DISTRIBUTION

- a. Periodic Reports will be submitted daily as of 1600 by 1630.
- b. Negative Reports will be submitted every six hours.
- c. Maintenance of all records necessary to properly locate, identify, evaluate, safeguard and disseminate intelligence information will be made.
- d. Forwarding of information of operational importance to the United Nations and to Landing Force Headquarters will be via Regimental Headquarters.
- e. All units will keep up-to-date count of impounded and destroyed equipment.

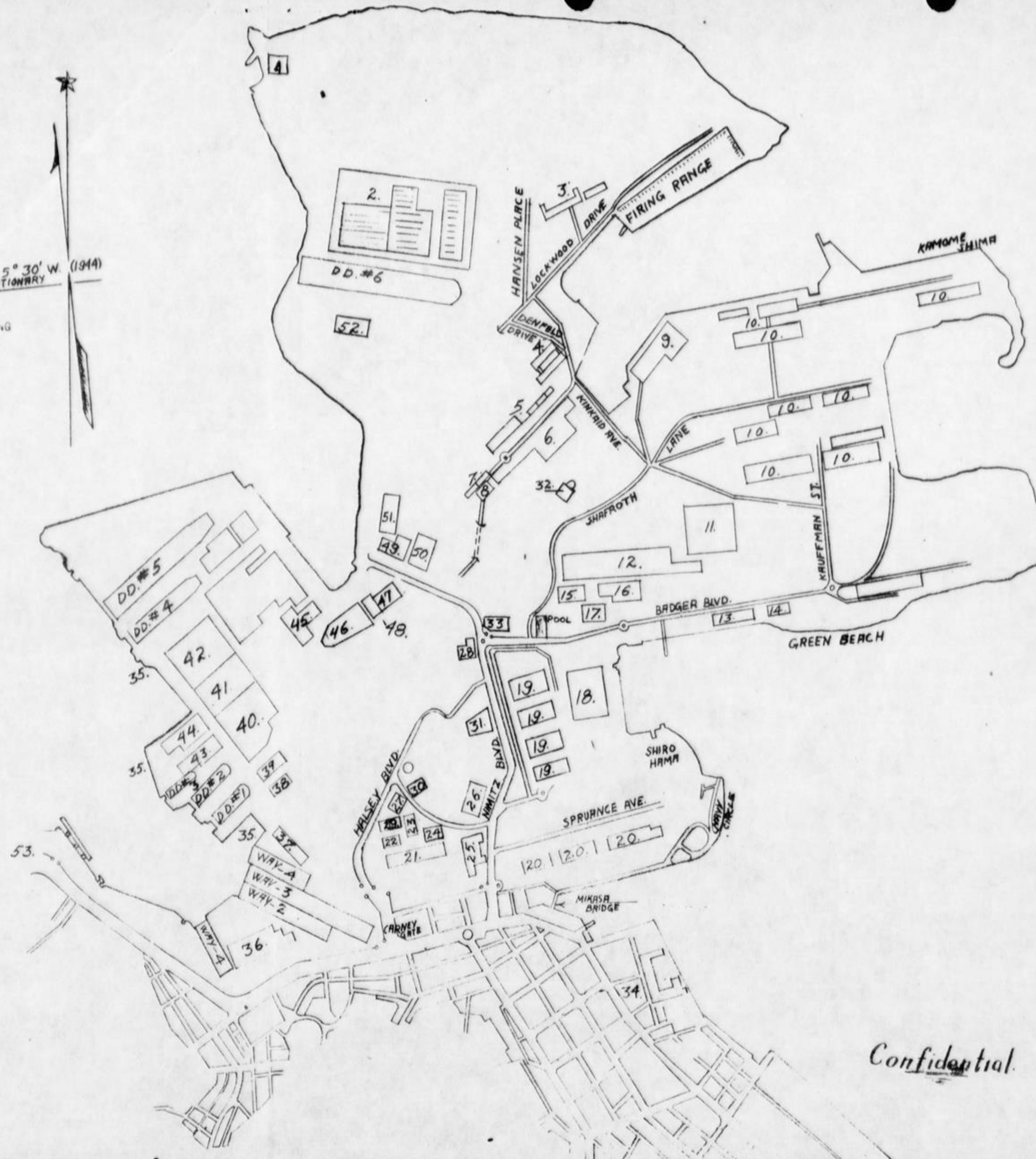

1. SUPPLIES

- (a) Regimental Headquarters and Battalions establish own dumps initially in vicinity GREEN Beach (see Annex A to CTU 31.3.3 Op Order No. 1-45). Supply activities be prepared to consolidate dumps on order and operate central dump.
- (b) Rations.
 - (1) Each officer and man shall be landed with one day's battle ration in his pack.
 - (2) Two day's additional packaged battle rations for each officer and man shall accompany each unit, and shall be dumped as in (a) above.
- (c) Water.
 - (1) Two full canteens per officer and man shall be landing equipment.
 - (2) Additional filled containers, as available, shall be landed with each unit and dumped as in (a) above.
 - (3) Local water sources shall not be used until certified by Regimental Medical Officer.
- (d) Medical.
 - (1) Each Battalion shall land 5 day's supplies and dump as directed by Regimental Medical Officer.

2. SECRECATION

- (a) Personnel Casualties will be transferred to other medical facilities direct within the area by Battalion medical officers in accordance with general directives of Regimental Medical Officer.
- (b) Burial will be conducted in Task Force Cemetery to be designated.
- (c) Salvage shall be carried out as may be directed by higher authority.
- (d) Captured and Confiscated Material
 - (1) All foreign small arms shall be transported promptly to Regimental Weapons Dump which will be established near Naval Barracks, GREEN Beach.
 - (2) Battalions report quantity captured and confiscated material in daily report.
- (e) Japanese Military Personnel
 - (1) Battalions establish own stockades.
 - (2) Guard these personnel from storerooms YOKOSUKA Naval Station.
- (f) Japanese Civilian Personnel
 - (1) All civilians except key personnel shall be evicted from YOKOSUKA Navy Yard.
 - (2) Key personnel retained will be reported to Regimental Headquarters and will not be permitted to leave the Navy Yard. These personnel

will be berthed and subsisted as directed by Regimental Headquarters who will also dictate their final disposition.

- (g) Repatriates will be transported to YOKOSUKA Naval Hospital where they will be reported to Regimental Medical Officer for further disposition.

3. TRANSPORT

- (a) Motor Transport will be provided by 4th Marines (Reinf.) as practicable.
- (b) Water Transportation will be provided by Beach Guard Boat Pools.

4. PERSONNEL

- (a) Mail will be collected and censored in accordance provisions of Regimental Order No. 2-45. Parent vessels' return mailing address will be used. Regimental Intelligence Officer will provide for depositing mail with a postal agency.
- (b) Unit Commanders shall enforce strict military discipline.
- (c) Military conduct and general smartness shall be stressed.
- (d) Existing buildings may later be designated for official use as determined by higher authority.
- (e) Uniform and Equipment
- (1) For debarkation - dungarees, helmets, leggings, heavy marching order pack, and assigned arms. Carry 2 canteens and panchos.
 - (2) Packs shall remain with individual.
 - (3) Undress blues, packaged, shall be landed with respective units and collected at unit dumps.
- (f) Daily strength reports shall be made by Battalions prior 1600 each day in accordance Regimental Order 3-45.
- (g) Sanitation and Hygiene
- (1) Strict field sanitation shall be enforced by all unit commanders.
 - (2) First Aid Stations will be set up ashore.

ANNEX A TO THIRD FLEET NAVAL LANDING FORCE ADMINISTRATIVE
ORDER CTU 31.3.3 NO. 1-45

CONFIDENTIAL

MEDICAL

1. The mission of the Battalion Medical Officers is:
 - (a) To advise the Battalion Commanders, THIRD Fleet Naval Landing Force, on all medical matters.
 - (b) To explore the existing medical facilities in their areas of responsibility.
 - (c) To appraise the medical requirements and provide emergency care for their battalions.
 - (d) To set up battalion aid stations at Battalion Headquarters.
 - (e) To detail Hospital Corpsmen to duty with the companies as may be required and to supervise their activities.
 - (f) To keep the Regimental Surgeon fully informed as to medical problems arising in their battalions and the requirements as to medical supplies. Replenishment of supplies will be by exchange with the next higher medical activity whenever practicable.
 - (g) To submit daily a morning report of the sick to the Battalion Commander prior to 1000.
 - (h) To obtain authorization for transfer and transportation of the sick and injured to other medical activities in The Area whenever necessary.
 - (i) To effect dissemination of information on field hygiene and sanitation to all officers and men in their battalions.
 - (j) To advise the Battalion Commanders as to the suitability of living and messing spaces selected for troops.
 - (k) To effect disinsectization of living and messing spaces prior to occupancy by their battalions.
 - (l) To make daily inspection of messing and galley spaces, living spaces and sanitary facilities used by their battalions.
 - (m) To be prepared to assist in the care and processing of repatriates when and as directed by higher authority.
2. SANITARY REGULATIONS
 - (a) Adherence to sanitary requirements is a serious obligation of commands and the individual. A number of known serious diseases exist in Japanese territory. Other dangerous diseases may be expected to occur due to the disruption of sanitary control measures caused by war conditions. There must be awareness that various diseases follow in the wake of malnutrition and debilitating influences.
 - (b) Unit commanders are responsible for sanitation within their units.
3. WATER
 - (a) All local water supplies should be considered unsafe, including municipal water systems, until thoroughly tested and approved. All water used for drinking, bathing, cooking, teeth cleaning, etc., will be acquired from approved sources.
 - (b) There will be no bathing in freshwater streams or harbor waters.
 - (c) Bare feet must not be exposed to the ground or fresh water streams.
4. FOOD
 - (a) Native foods will not be consumed. All food will be protected from contamination and spoilage.

5. INSECT AND RODENT CONTROL

- (a) Mosquitoes: Other than the general application of DDT to the occupied area, individual effort to control mosquitoes will be applied by the use of nets and insecticides.
- (b) Lice and flies: Infestation will be avoided by means of personal hygiene and use of DDT. The use of native mats, beds, or clothing is prohibited. Insect repellants will be applied to seams and openings of clothing.
- (c) Mites: Mites will be controlled by the use of DDT in clothing and use of insect repellant.
- (d) Rodents: Rodent control is essential to prevent the spread of plague. measures to eliminate rats will be effected by the epidemiological squad.

6. WASTE DISPOSAL:

Presumably the area to be initially occupied will have toilets. In the event that they are absent or non-operative, it will be necessary to resort to pit latrines, which must be treated with DDT or lime, and at the earliest practicable date provided with screens and box seats. Garbage and rubbish will be burned or buried. Where modern toilet facilities are absent, it will be of the highest importance that a thorough policing of the temporary head facilities be maintained. If and when "straddle trenches" are used, sentries must be stationed near them.

7. VENEREAL CONTROL

All contacts will be avoided.

8. RECORDS

The sick and injured will be logged with name, rate, service number, unit and diagnosis. This information and accident reports will be recorded at Regimental Headquarters (Medical).

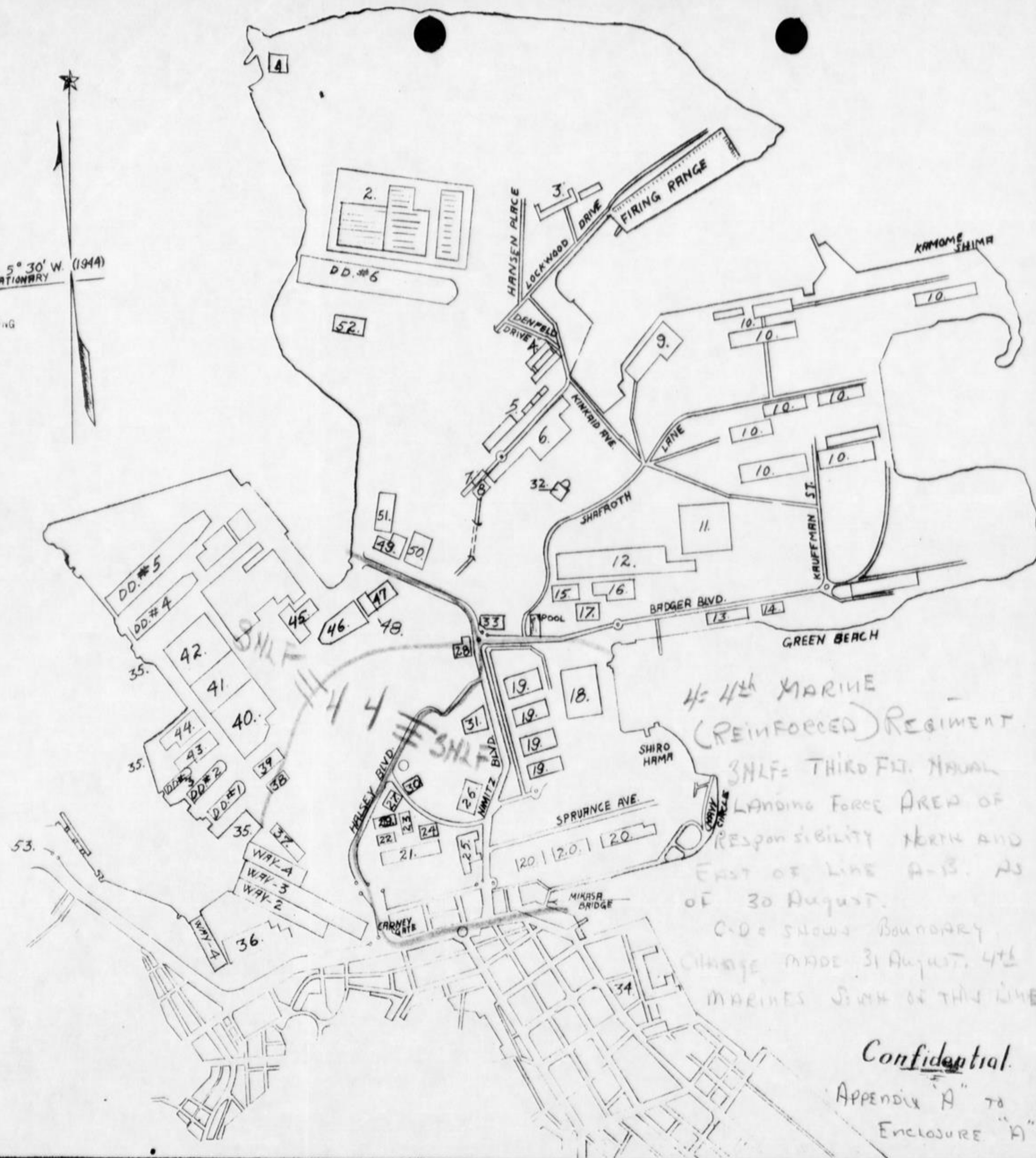
