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





## PART I

## BRIEF SULMARY

During the period under review, the U.S.S. S.I. JACINTO operated off the coast of HONSHU. Operations consisted of Combat Air Patrols over the Task Force, special patrols over the TOKYO area in support of the landing of the occupation forces at TOKYO BAY, and the delivery of supplies to Prisoner of War camps on the island of HONSHU.

On 21 August, Air Group FORTY-NINE was transferred to the U.S.S. BATLAN and Air Group FORTY-SEVEN embarked.

On 24 August, Captain Hugh H. GOODWIN, USN, assumed command vice Captain Michael H. KERODLE, USN, detached.

## PART II

## PRELIMINARIES

The U.S.S. SAN JACINTO operated tactically as a unit of Task Group THIRTY-EIGHT POINT ONE, a part of Task Force THIRLI-EIGHT, THIRD Fleet, UNITED STATES PACIFIC FLEET, from 16 August until detached on 31 August 1945 for return to the UNITED STATES.

## CHRONOLOGICAL SUMARY

## 16 August 1945

Operating tactically as a unit of Task Group THIRTY-EIGHT POINT ONE in waters southeast of HONSHU. Following the cessation of hostilities, the Task Group had retired on a southerly course. Flight operations were limited to Combat Air Patrols. The SAN JACINTO launched three (3) tow planes for gunnery exercises which were held during the morning. Flying conditions were average to good with light variable winds and a slight sea.

Sunset 1812 1200 - Lat. 32° 34.8' N., Long. 142° 06.1 E. 2000 - Lat. 32° 24.4' N., Long. 142° 31.5 E. 2000 - Lat. 32° 18.3' N., Long. 144° 38.8 E.

0727 - Launched tow planes, 3 VT. 0920 - Manned Torpedo Defense Stations for gunnery exercises. 1027 - Secured from Torpedo Defense. 1233 - Recovered tow planes, 3 VT.

## 17 August 1945

Operating tactically as a unit of Task Group THIRTY-EIGHT POINT ONE in the same area southeast of HONSHU. Again flight opertions were limited to Co, bat Air Patrols and the supplying of tow planes. The SAN JACINTO provided four (4) tow planes. Gunnery exercises were held during the afternoon. Flying condition were average to good with moderate easterly winds and a slight sea.

Sunset 1812 0800 - Lat. 32° 53.5° N., Long. 143° 54.8° E. Sunset 1812 1200 - Lat. 32° 27.5° N., Long. 144° 10.9° E. 2000 - Lat. 33° 06.8' N., Long. 143° 11.0' E.

0727 - Launched tow planes, 4 VT.

1104 - Recovered tow planes, 4 VT.

## 18 August 1945

Operating tactically as a unit of Task Group THIRI -EIGHT POINT ONE in waters southeast of HONSHU. A rendezvous was effected with the Fueling and Replenishment Group. Air operations for the S.N J.CINTO were limited to one (1) Combat Air Patrol. Gunnery exercises were conducted during the morning. Flying conditions were good with moderated easterly winds and a slight sea.

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Sunset 1808 1200 - Lat. 31° 57.5' N., Long. 143° 51.5' E. Sunset 1808 1200 - Lat. 31° 31.4' N.; Long. 144° 06.4' E. 2000 - Lat. 31° 02.0' N., Long. 144° 17.0' E.

Flying conditions were average with winds moderate to fresh, east northeasterly, and a slight to moderate sea.

Sunrise 0453 0800 - Lat. 31° 34.0' N., Long. 143° 21.6' E. Sunset 1807 1200 - Lat. 31° 06.8' N., Long. 143° 40.2' E. 2000 - Lat. 30° 40.2' N., Long. 143° 49.1' E.

0738 - Marine Detachment was transferred to the U.S.S. JOHN RODGERS (DD-754), for further transfer for temporary duty with the First Battalion Marine Landing Force.

#### 20 August 1945

Operating tactically as a unit of Task Group THIRTY-EIGHT POINT ONE southeast of HONSHU, in company with the Fueling and Replenishment Group. The SAN JACINTO took on ammunition. No flight swere scheduled for the SAN JACINTO. Flying conditions were average with fresh east northeasterly winds and a moderate to slight sea.

Sunrise 0455 0800 - Lat. 31° 29:5' N.; Long. 143° 28.7' E. Sunset 1805 1200 - Lat. 30° 58.0' N., Long. 143° 53.8' E. 2000 - Lat. 30° 40.3' N., Long. 143° 58.4' E.

The SAN JACINTO left Task Group THIRTY-EIGHT POINT ONE temporarily and rendezvoused with Task Group THIRTY-EIGHT POINT THREE to effect a transfer of Air Groups and planes with the U.S.S. BATAAN, Air Group FORTY-NINE going to and Air Group FORTY-SEVEN coming from the BATAAN, Flight operations for the SAN JAC-INTO were limited to the exchange of planes with the BATAAN. Flying Conditions were average to undesirable with fresh northeasterly winds and a moderate to slight sea.

Glying conditions were average to undesirable with winds south to south southeasterly, fresh and strong. The sea was rough with moderate swell.

Flying conditions were average with moderate to fresh southerly winds and slight sea with moderate swell.

0800 - Lat. 35° 37.0' N., Long. 143° 55.3' E. 1200 - Lat. 36° 23.0' N., Long. 143° 51.7' E. Sunrise 0430 Sunset 1800 2000 - Lat. 37° 52.1' N., Long. 143° 19.6' E.

Packages of supplies were dropped in the prison compounds at IWAKI and two camps near NIIGATA. Flying conditions were average with fresh southwesterly winds and a slight to moderate sea and swell.



#### PHOTOGRAPHY

During the period covered by this report, a total of six (6) Photographic Missions was flown by the photographic plane, F6F-5P. A total of five (5) missions was flown in TBM's by photographer's mates who were attached to the photographic laboratory of the ship. All missions were flown after the surrender of Japan, the principal assignments being to photograph Prisoner of War Camps. The absence of AA opposition permitted the pilots to fly as low and as slowly as they chose, with the result that pictures were obtained which were of a lar e scale and with a sharpness at that scale that was almost unknown under combat conditions.

The K-17 6-inch and K-17 12-inch combination was used exclusively in the photographic plane. The photographer's mates carried F-8 15-inch cameras.

This excellent view of the NACETSU Prisoner of War Camp in Northern HONSHU was taken by a low flying SAN JACINTO photo plane on the first POW Mission, 25 August 1945.

An estimated 250 prisoners are visible within the compound and on the roofs of the barracks buildings. Occupants of the camp had just finished laying out the message "Food and smokes" when this picture was taken. Of special interest is the open gate near the lower right hand corner of the largest building.
