DISPOSITION OF AMER. STAFF DURING KOBE P.O.W. HOST FIRE

JUNE 5, 1945

STRADLEY - Night duty - ate breakfast late - in dining when 1st bomb hit
tried to put out fire etc

WALLACE - Evacuated gas from Wd T to Wd with exception of Hermselgen
who was left in Cook's room. Standing just in doorway of Cook's room
when bombs struck. Roof + upper deck collapsed into room knocking
Wallace out into passage. Immediately went up into flames. Tried
to get out just then regretted that found that blocked. Then
tried each way, but Wd I + II. Tried to get back into Cook's room
then window, but glass was in ferns. Rec'd injuries. See my note.

JAMES - Aug 51 - Got fainted carrying stores - standing in Wd T ^(top of stairs) passage
way when building was struck. Several expl. in front of him. He crawled
under sink - bldg collapsed after which he crawled out under of Room
then the debris.

BOLSTER In III wch office, 3 small combats in office - Reed (Pt) came in
clothing on fire. Drove got him out. Found him on deck. Everyone out
so left. Then thought of getting O.C. but whole of wch was an in ferns
left around behind gully to walk bet. O.C. + Wd I - likely extricate
Down then back with. Removed gear from O.C. (went on night watch)

FLOO - In passage of wch when bomb struck - bldg collapsed burying
him beneath timber. One large plank across back preventing him from
getting out. Tom Lyle pulled timber off of him & helped him out.
After getting out - saw an arm sticking out from debris - called
for assistance. Bolster + Chung-man helped him to take timber off
Down. Then removed gear from O.C.

was sent to try of III for fire water
when it was not - tryed to get down stairs. Then body against
base in window & out - rolled down stairs. Come up. Then side of gully
helped. Helped up - another way toward III met William carrying

at Lupton - whose leg was on fire. Helped put fire out - turned
about further jts in W.D. - William stated that he could not
hear any one else. ~~William~~ Helped take Lupton to place
of safety. Made way back to W.D. - but W.D. was blazing inferno
(on inferno marks)

Irvin - In office of III - W.D. just returned from carrying
store when bomb struck. Immediate fire in W.D.
Reid, who happened to be just outside office door came in
with his clothes on fire. Threw him to deck & put out
fire - then helped him out. Carried equip from J.R.

Williams - In passageway entrance to W.D. when B. struck.
Thrown to ground & unable to see for few seconds because
of dust - ~~then~~ then saw whole side of III (side opp. W.D.)
collapsed & fierce flame. Heard cries & went to assistance
at Lupton - whose clothes were on fire - also
no other of these who was able to free himself.
Assisted Lupton to place of safety & help of Willie band
Returned to W.D. III, but by that time place was an
inferno.

Wolf - In W.D. main passage - thrown down when bomb struck.
got out crawling over debris at entrance to W.D.

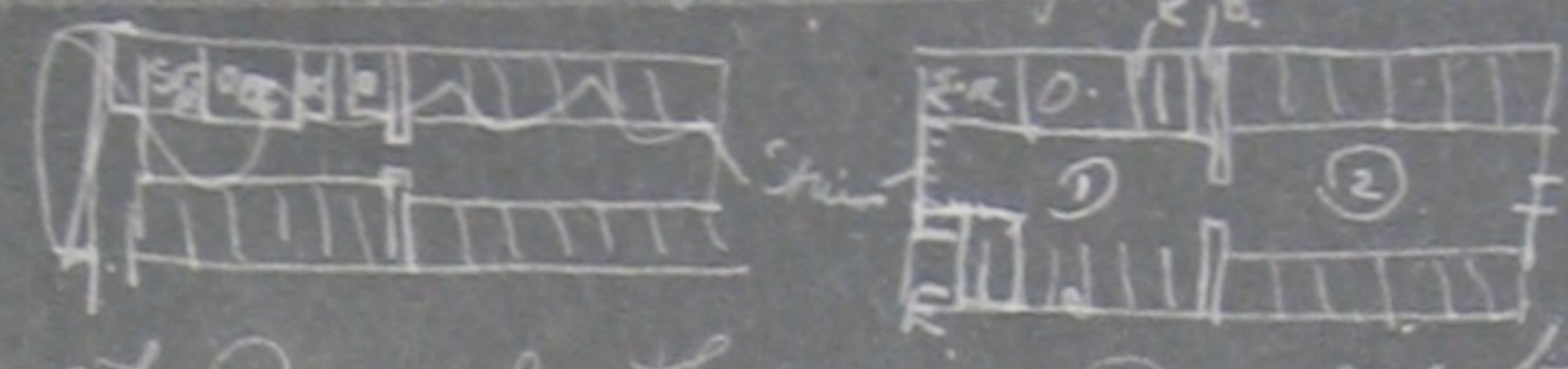
Lyall - just finished carrying supplies out. Beneath staircase in W.D. when
hit - staircase collapsed - buried - dug self out - uncovered floor. Got ashworth
out using long timber as lever - help of Page & Smith. Retrieved stuff from W.D. with
me.

21 - Injured. Total in Hoop, 128
3 - Killed.

The second alarm was sounded at approx. 0550 June 5th 1945. The Hoop staff + pts. were alerted. As there did not seem to be any immediate danger Breakfast was served at approx 0700. The actual bombing commenced about 0730 ~~with~~ with the planes starting at the east part of Kobe coming in waves. Pts were evacuated from one Wd to ii Wd - the except. of Hemmelgen who was placed in the Cook's room. All pts in ii ward were brought to the main floor & a group was taken out to the shelter. All remaining pts in iii Wd were brought downstairs & were later moved to the shelter. Red Cross food, clothing, medicine & equipment were taken & placed in the shelter designated for such a purpose. 10 bags of rice, soya butter & dried fish were taken from the store room & placed on the ground near the shelter. All beds & blankets of pts & staff were placed outside the buildings ~~on~~ on the grounds. At approx. 0815 the planes were flying directly over the Hoop & fires were already started below us in direct line to the sea. The sun was blotted out because of the smoke & pieces of tin metal & spent bullets were dropping in the grounds. At approx. 0830 the Hoop ~~was~~ ^{was} struck - as indicated in the diagram. At least 10 large oil bombs hitting the grounds of which 5 hit the Hoop bldg & one the stores shelter, & numerous small bombs. The bldgs collapsed where hit & fires were instantaneous. The dry timber taking hold ~~was~~ ^{was} sure to become roaring inferno. Luckily, Wd. ii which housed the majority of the Pts was straddled by heavy oil bombs - a half doz or so small bombs struck it but they did not penetrate the upper deck. The bomb that hit the bridge blew in the upper half of the wall of the lower ward. 3 large bombs hit iii & triggering a number of the staff there in, & injuring a few.

...placed receiving one of the bombs
killed him out right. iii. Wd. rec'd 2 heavy bombs
at the W. end. One of them, as far as we could determine

between Knight & Byall & I believe they were instantly
killed - as the big bomb



struck pt ① only those in ① were burned with the exception
of Hill, who was sitting down at the end of his bunk next to the
door + Mayers + Cook. In Pt one Byall + Knight were
killed, Lupton, Rouken, Nieldant, Lewis, Nead, Reed
were burned. the 3 being the worse. In Bldg:

Ashworth + Dorn were trapped beneath fallen beam
+ had to be extricated. D. Bag rec'd a blow from splinter
beam across his back. Eather, Hepferson, Wolf,
Wallace, Haggas, Scott, James, Taylor, were burned
+ Beauchamp + William rec'd small cuts + bruise.

No one was inj. in II, all pts being evacuated with
no difficulty. Pts were evacuated up the street
hill. I remained behind salvaging blankets
until driven out of the compound by the fire which
had spread to the main office Bldg + OK. Pts were

returned about 3 hrs later + an evening the
badly burned + seriously ill were placed in the
mosque + hetai house. As a ^{last} bomb had struck
the stores shelter all the food, clothes, medicine, etc
were burned. We were able to salvage some of the best
food + a little of the medicine + first aid kits. Four of the

Doctors had saved their emergency kits + these were pooled
+ with this + what medicine was salvaged we went to
work on the burn cases - setting up two tables outside the
mosque + throwing some mats between the roof + the
fence to act as a shelter. We worked until about 11:00

that evening on the burn + wounds. That night pts
stayed in the exception of those pts in the mosque + house

There were not enough blankets to go around, & the Saldier loaned us some. Dr. Thakie kindly gave his room up to the use of the doctor.

The following morn. Dr. Page + 57 pts + staff left for an 8-10 mile hike to Kawasaki Camp. ~~They left~~ I was left in charge of the remaining cases of which 39 were stretcher cases & the remaining 13 were walking cases & assistance. Our small group was kept very busy attending to the brown cases, particularly & the Conger man, Hildebrand, McCreedy, Retana, Bolster, William, Beauding, Keller, were all but worn out. The difficulty & discomfort were beyond describing. About 1900 I was told by Dr. Thakie that we would stay another night in the compound & as it looked like a storm coming up, we built a temp. shelter for those pts who had been resting in the open. About 1930 U.S. Troops + 100 men from Kobe Camp arrived in order to organize + proceed at once for Kawasaki Camp. It was already getting dark, we had 39 stretcher cases & only 9 stretchers, 100 men where 200 would have been much more like it, darkness, & a storm - for it began to rain & blow quite hard. Protectors were of no avail as order was order, so the 9 worse cases were placed on the stretchers, & the of the pts had 2 men assigned to each to help. (a few had 4) as best they could. In a driving rain with a fierce wind, ^{& added darkness} we walked for 3 hours until we came to Kawasaki Station - there Dr. Thakie took it upon himself to attempt to procure a train (electric) which would bring us over the worst part of the journey (the 2nd half) which was all my gale. It

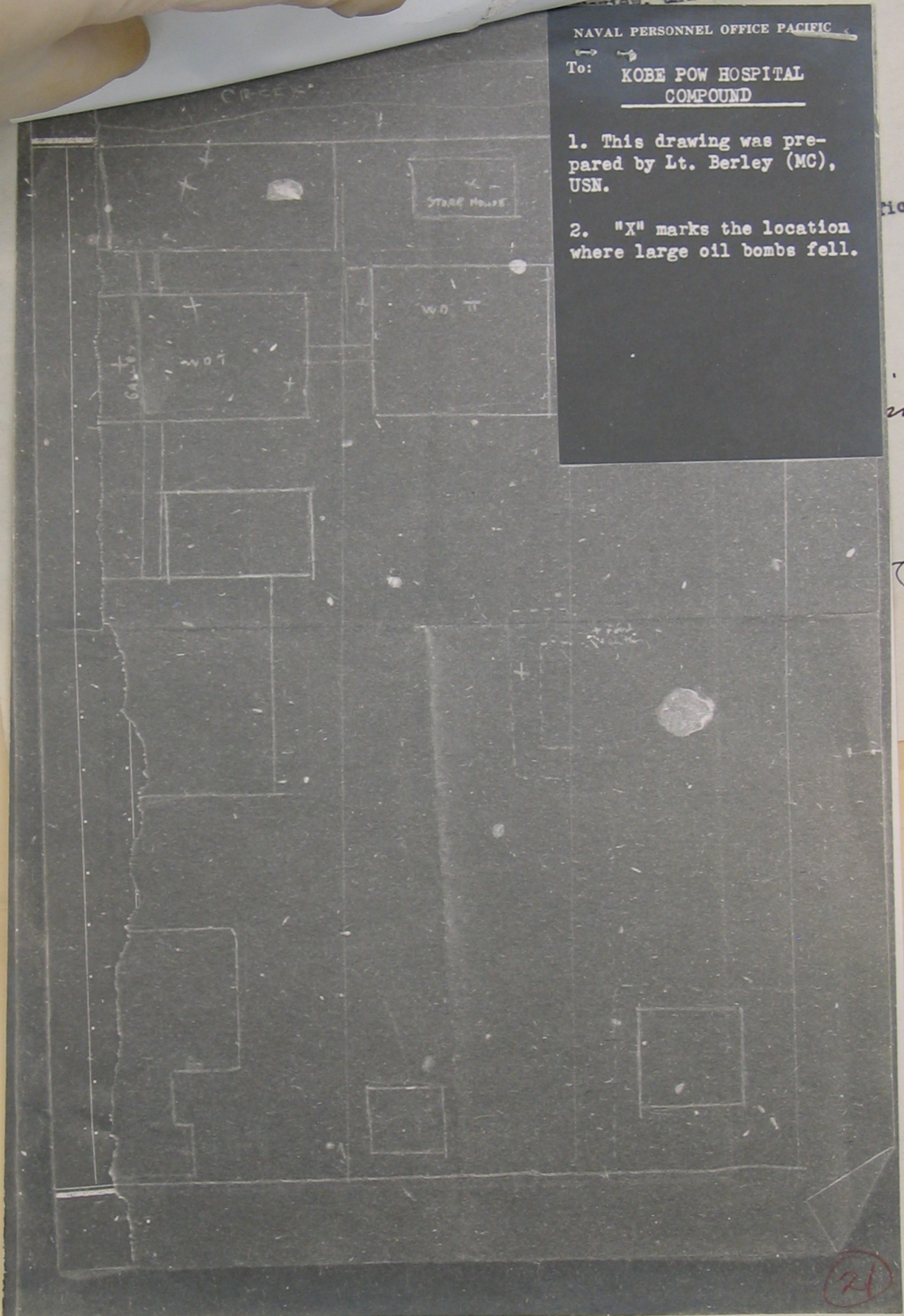

SUBJECT - HEALTH OF AUSTRALIAN SOLDIERS.

Dear Sir,

I would like to draw your attention, as our new Camp Commandant, to the above subject.

The following information concerning the Australian soldiers in this Camp, I have already embodied in letters addressed to Lieut. Morimoto, dated 7 Sept, 14 Sept, 16 Sept, and 18 Oct 1943.

HISTORY OF THE GROUP.

The number of soldiers of the Australian Imperial Force who were taken prisoner in Singapore, was approximately 15,000. During the ensuing months working Parties of A.I.F. personnel were sent away to various working camps in Burma, Thailand, Borneo, and Japan, until in May 1943 there were little over 1,000 Australian soldiers left in Singapore. These consisted mainly of Hospital Staff and patients (including permanently crippled and incapacitated persons), a small administrative staff, and a proportionately large number of Officers.

The result of this is that the Australians in Kobe House (who left Singapore on 15 May 1943) consist largely of men who were left behind by the original working parties owing to age or sickness. In fact, a number of these men were actually discharged from hospital to come to Japan, as we were informed that the party was regarded as a convalescent party, and would be placed in a convalescent camp.

AGE. The average age of the Australian soldiers is 33.2 years, in comparison with that of the British (29.82 years), and the American (28.80 years). There are two men whose age exceeds 50 years, (593 Sgt.P.K. Martin and 613 L/Cpl W. Adlam).

HEALTH. Although the general health of the Australian soldiers has definitely improved since arrival in Kobe Camp, there are few individuals who, either owing to age or the permanent after-effects of wounds or sickness, are unfitted for further work, and whose ultimate recovery and return to useful civilian life, depends upon complete rest and adequate feeding.

Does a camp exist in Japan for the reception of such cases and, if so, would it be possible to transfer these men to it?

As senior officer of the Australian Imperial Force in this camp it is my duty to do all in my power to safeguard the health of these men, and in consequence I appeal to you to give earnest consideration to my request.

As a bona fide of my authority to represent my Government in this matter, I would draw attention to the fact that, at the time of my becoming a Prisoner of War, I was the second in command of the Allied force in the Island of Timor.


