STATEMENT OF COMMANDER SARTIN
Re:
BILIBID HOSPITAL RECORDS

As former Senior Medical Officer of the U.S. Naval Hospital Unit, Bilibid Prison, Manila, P.I., from 30 May 1942 until relieved by Commander T.H. Hayes, MC, USN, on 1 October 1943, I desire to make the following statement at this time as a matter of official record:

The Medical Department at Bilibid Prison, known as the "U.S. Naval Hospital Unit of Bilibid Prison, Manila, P.I.", but officially designated as "Bilibid Hospital for Military Prison Camps of the Philippine Islands" by the Japanese, was organized by the medical personnel serving as prisoners under the Japanese Military Administration of the Philippines, with the proper sanction of that administration, for the medical care of prisoners of war assigned to that institution. It was organized as a regular naval hospital unit, with departments, offices, and wards, and it was patterned and administered as nearly as possible, under prevailing prison conditions, along the lines of a naval hospital.

The administrative and personnel office of this hospital unit prepared all reports required by the Japanese authorities, such as daily census record, vital reports, and other local reports, and maintained a complete set of records essential to the administration of a naval hospital. Among the records thus kept were personnel records of officers and men attached to the unit, statistical reports and morbidity statistics, certificates of death and a register of the dead, and such other basic reports and returns as were indicated.

Some of these records were salvaged by PhMlc Robert W. Kentner on 5 February 1945, and were delivered personally to Lt.-Comdr. E.G. Dennis, HC, USN, on 21 April 1945. These records are now being inventoried and arranged for proper dissemination by the Hospital Corps Archives Unit. Kentner states that many of the local records were taken over by the Army authorities, and that he believes these included the officer personnel records, reports of death, register of the dead, and the individual medical histories of personnel hospitalized in the unit. It is assumed that such of these as appertain to this Bureau's personnel and activities have been, or will be eventually, released to the Bureau of Medicine and Surgery.

The personnel records of the individual officers and enlisted men were kept up by the administrative office, in charge of Pharmacist C.K. Condon, assisted by Pharmacist's Mates Kentner, Bjurling and McCurry. These records show individual military history of those concerned, as it was made available, covering the dates 12-8-41 to 2-5-45. The records include, besides regular naval medical personnel, a few records of seamen strikers who were inducted into Hospital Corps duties, and some Army medical corpsmen who were assigned to the Bilibid unit.

STATEMENT BY COMMANDER SARTIN: RE: BILIBID HOSPITAL RECORDS

During the first several months of the existence of this unit, the administration held regular training classes for hospital corpsmen, until the assembly of classes was forbidden by the Japanese, after which smaller groups assembled for study and instruction. Periodic examinations for advancement in rating were given. Men were advanced when qualified, subject to final approval of the Bureau of Navigation. Examination reports, duly graded and signed, were prepared for all men so advanced, and it is believed the greater part of these were salvaged by Pharmacist's Mate Kentner.

As of this date I have reviewed and signed the salvaged military records compiled in Bilibid Prison of those men in this group who have thus far been rescued. I recommend that the originals of these records be forwarded to the Bureau of Naval Personnel, and that they be accepted as official military records of the individuals concerned. I regret that the individual records of the officers were not salvaged, but am informed by Pharmacist's Mate Kentner that he believes these were among the records salvaged by the Army authorities.

Among the records salvaged by Kentner at the time of his rescue is his personal journal, which he kept hidden from the Japanese. It was kept on his own initiative and responsibility, for which he deserves full credit. It appears to be remarkably accurate in the entries recorded and is comprehensive in scope and it is considered a valuable addition to the records thus far salvaged. In it are incorporated records of death and burial of personnel dying within the jurisdiction of the unit; dates of arrival and departure of prisoner drafts, with pertinent information thereto; figures on prison census; dates of advancement of personnel advanced conditionally or otherwise; rosters of personnel on duty at certain dates; drawings of plants occupied by the hospital unit in its wanderings from Canacao to Bilibid; and much other important data of various types.

There is also among the records salvaged by Kentner a large map drawing of Bilibid Prison. It was made by Pharmacist's Mate Louis Novak, and is dated 14 May, 1943.

INVENTORY OF STAFF WAR RECORDS
BILIBID PRISON HOSPITAL, MANILA, P.I.

On 21 April, 1945, PhMlc Robert W. Kentner, a repatriated prisoner from Bilibid Military Prison Camp, Manila, P.I., turned over to Lt.-Comdr. E. G. DENNIS, Officer in Charge, Hospital Corps Section, BuMed, for proper dissemination, a quantity of personnel and other records appertaining to the administration of the Bilibid Prison Hospital.

These records were kept surreptitiously under the supervision of the Senior Medical Officer, Commander L.B.Sartin MC USN (5-30-42 to 10-1-43), and Commander T.H.Hayes, MC USN subsequent to 1 October 1943 until the naval medical personnel were relieved by Army medical personnel on orders of the Japanese military authorities.

The administrative office of the prison hospital was in charge of Pharmacist Clifford K. Condon, assisted by Pharmacist's Mates R.W.Kentner, E.W.Bjurling, and D.R.McCurry. Local records which it was resired to maintain and salvage if possible, were secreted in a prepared crypt behind the reservoir of a toilet built into the prison hospital office. After the removal of patients from the hospital on the liberation of Bilibid, 4 February, 1945, Kentner salvaged many of these records by leaving his personal effects behind and stowing the records in his hand luggage.

Records salvaged include the "Prison War Records" of medical personnel on the Staff of Bilibid Prison Hospital, as enumerated below:

- I. Army Medical Personnel assigned to Bilibid Hospital - - - 8
- II. Navy Hospital Corpsmen, repatriated - - - - - 12
- III. Navy Hospital Corpsmen, not repatriated - - - - - 184
- TOTAL ENLISTED PERSONNEL RECORDS OF POW's - - - - - 203

Also included is a carbon copy (unsigned; original signed paper not found) of a commendation given all members of the Staff by Commander Hayes on May 17, 1944. A mimeographed copy of this commendation is included as Page 12 of this memo, and a copy has been attached to the "war record" of each man concerned.

On April 24, 1945, Commander Sartin reviewed these records, and approved for the Bureau of Medicine and Surgery the 12 records applying to the repatriated POWs of group II, above. He made a statement certifying the bona fide nature of these salvaged records. A certified copy of his signed statement (mimeographed) is included as pages 10 and 11 of this memo.

Dear Mrs. Clough:

Your son, James Burton Clough, Pharmacist's Mate third class, United States Navy, has been carried on the official records of the Navy Department as a prisoner of war in Japan.

It is with deep regret that this Bureau now informs you that your son died on 16 March 1945 while being held a prisoner of war in Omori Prisoner of War Camp #10-B, Japan. This information concerning his death was obtained from records maintained by Japanese authorities at the Headquarters Camp at Omori, which were recovered by our forces.

The Bureau deeply regrets its inability to supply further information at this time. Now that the Japanese have surrendered, additional information is becoming available daily. Should further details be received concerning your son, they will be forwarded to you by the Navy Department.

Pursuant to the provisions of Section 2 of Public Law 490, 77th Congress, as amended, entitlement to pay and allowances extends to the date the evidence of death was received in the Navy Department, which, in this instance, is fixed at 1 October 1945. The various agencies of the government having jurisdiction over the settlement of death benefits in cases involving deceased naval personnel are being informed. These agencies will forward directly to you the necessary forms to be used in order to file claim for any benefits to which you may be entitled.

The Navy Department extends sincere sympathy to you in your great sorrow, and hopes that you may find comfort in the knowledge that your son gave his life in the service of his country.

INVENTORY: BILIBID RECORDS

Prisoner of War records recovered by American forces since the liberation of Bilibid Prison, 4 February 1945, began to arrive from various sources in the Hospital Corps Archives about 21 April. Some of these have been brought in directly by liberated personnel, some mailed in from the field, some channelled from the War Department and the Bureau of Naval Personnel.

An attempt has been made to inventory, sort, and edit all such material as soon as possible, and make it available to the cognizant branch. The largest possession of clinical records came in one group from the War Department, via BuPers. There are 2099 pieces of all sorts, covering 1242 names (many duplicates). Several hundred pieces of additional material not yet inventoried, has been received since.

To make this material available for study at any subsequent time, the Archives Unit has sorted it by classes, and inventoried it by names of men concerned. Additional pages will be added to this inventory as additional material arrives.

During this period of internment, Pharmacist's Mate Second Class Clough was continuously on duty, on any detail assigned him. He cheerfully carried on with his duties despite the short rations and constant harassing by Japanese sentries. He gave willingly of his meager supply of food, clothing and other necessary articles to the less fortunate and ill prisoners brought to the hospital from other work camps in the islands. He worked long hours daily, many more than normally expected, assisting in every possible way to alleviate pain and suffering among the inmates of the hospital prison. His tireless efforts and outstanding devotion to duty despite personal deprivation and danger contributed materially to the successful operation of the hospital for military prisoners and was instrumental in many of the prisoners returning alive who might otherwise have died from disease and starvation. Bronze Medal Is Given To Parents

Mr. and Mrs. Joel R. Clough of
Clear Lake have received the
bronze star medal, awarded pos-
thumously to their son, James Bur-
ton Clough, pharmacist, third class
in the U. S. navy who lost his life in
a Japanese prison camp, it was re-
vealed today.

The award, presented by the
secretary of the navy, was for ex-
ceptional bravery and gallantry
during the time James Clough was
a member of the hospital corps de-
tachment at Little Baguio at Ba-
taan during the Japanese invasion
of the Philippines. Clough, the ci-
tation read, showed outstanding
bravery and coolness under fire
while helping to evacuate wound-
ed from Bataan and in aiding doc-
tors with casualties.

Clough was interred in Bilibio
prison camp at Manila by the in-
vadars and later transferred to
Camp O'Donnell where he died.

He was born at Willmar, Minn.,
and moved with his parents to
Clear Lake in 1928. He graduated
from Sedro-Woolley high school in
1937 and joined the navy on No-
vember 26, 1940. His survivors are
his father and mother; two broth-
ers, Conrad and Russell and a sis-
ter, Mrs. P. G. Roth, all but his
parents reside in Bremerton.

JAMES BURTON CLOUGH

James Burton Clough was born in Willmar Sept. 28, 1919. He attended the Lafayette School and the Methodist Sunday School in this city, un-



til he was nine years old when he went to Clear Lake, Wash., with his parents. There he graduated from grade school and attended the Community Sunday school and church. He graduated

from the Sedro Woolley High School in 1937. A year later he enrolled in the Conservation Corps and was honorably discharged June 29, 1940.

On Nov. 25th of that year he enlisted in the U. S. Navy Pharmacists Corps. He took initial training in San Diego, Cal., and after finishing that he entered the Navy Hospital in that city. After graduation there he was transferred to the Navy Hospital in Bremerton, Wash., and was stationed there four months.

Jim left for the Philippines on the U. S. S. Henderson on Aug. 12, 1941. There he was stationed near Manila in the Canacao Hospital as P. H. M. 3-c.

He was taken a prisoner of war when Bataan fell to the Japs. Six cards were received from prison camps where he was held, the last being from Cabanatuan. He was transferred from there to Japan Amori camp. Word was received Oct. 11, 1945, that according to the Japanese records found by American forces, Jim died on March 16, 1945.

Jim was the youngest of the family. He was always of a sunny disposition and really deserved his nickname of "Sunny Jim".

A sister preceded him in death on March 24, 1919. Those remaining to mourn him are, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Clough of Willmar, brother Conrad Wesley Clough and wife Eleanor, brother Russell Joel Clough, wife Virginia and their children, Sandra Lee and Jimmy Leland, a sister, Mrs. P. G. Roth (Marjorie), her husband and son, Harry George. Besides many relatives and friends in both Minnesota and Washington.

Dies In Japanese Prison



James Burton Clough, 26, of Clear Lake, died at Amori prison camp in Japan on March 16, 1945, according to word received recently by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Clough, of Willmar, Minnesota. Clough had been taken prisoner of war when Bataan fell and the last his parents had heard from him prior to the official announcement of his death, had been a card from the P.O.W. camps at Cabanatuan.

James Clough attended Clear Lake grade school and graduated from the Sedro-Woolley Union high school in 1937. He had come to Clear Lake from Willmar, Minnesota, his birthplace.

A year after his graduation from the Sedro-Woolley high school, he enrolled in the Civilian Conservation Corps and was honorably discharged from that organization on June 29, 1940. On November 25, 1940, he enlisted in the U. S. navy

pharmacists corps and took his initial training at San Diego. He received further training at the San Diego and Bremerton naval hospitals before leaving for the Philippines on August 12, 1941.

In the Philippines Clough was stationed in the Canacao navy hospital near Manila as a pharmacist mate, third class. He was taken prisoner of war when Bataan fell to the Japanese.

Always of a sunny and cheerful nature, Clough was known to his many boyhood friends in the area as "Sunny Jim." Surviving him are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Clough, of Willmar, Minnesota; a sister, Mrs. P. G. Roth; two brothers, Conrad Wesley Clough and Russell Joel Clough, and several nieces and nephews, all of Bremerton, besides several relatives both in Minnesota and Washington.

Posthumous Award From Navy Goes to James B. Clough

Posthumous award of the permanent citation for his Bronze Star Medal from Secretary of the Navy Forrestal, for the President, was recently made to James Burton Clough, it was announced here recently.

Clough, a graduate of Clear Lake grade school and the Sedro-Woolley high school class of 1937, died as a prisoner of war in Omiri Prison in Japan, where he had been held for about one year following his capture in the Philippines in 1942.

The Bronze Star was awarded to Clough for his service as pharmacist's mate, third class, USN, at Army General Hospital No. 1 at Little Baguis, during the defense of Bataan, and later as a prisoner of the Japanese at Camp O'Donnell and at Bilibid Prison, Manila.

Despite frequent bombing raids, Clough worked almost day and night during the dark days of early 1942, carrying out his duties as surgical assistant. When the hospital received bomb damage his duties were added to by the casualties among the hospital staff.

After his capture by the Japanese, Clough continued to serve the sick and wounded, saving many lives among his fellow prisoners.

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joel Clough, live at Clear Lake.

The text of the full citation is as follows:

When the hospital itself was hit and seriously damaged during bombing raids on March 30 and April 6, he labored unceasingly to care for casualties right in from the front lines, and for the casualties within the hospital and, although captured by Japanese military forces with his unit on April 9, continued unabatingly the professional task of caring for his sick and wounded comrades. By his skill and courage in the face of overwhelming odds, Clough aided materially in saving many lives, and his steadfast devotion to duty throughout upheld the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service."

Clough was born in Willmar, Minn., in 1919, and enlisted from Clear Lake in the Navy on November 26, 1940.
