3. Subversive Activities.

Captain YASHIMA, head of General Affairs Dept, l2th Naval Air Denot, declared that those classified documents of his unit which were not destroyed in air raids of March, April, and May, 1945, were burned on order of Commander, Combined Fleets, 17 August, 1945.

Pigeon coons on the roof of Prefectural Police Dent, SAGA were investigated. It was determined no pigeons had bean released, nor had ever been trained to carry messages.

D. CIVILIAN POPULATION

OITA Occupation Group renorts all civilians are quite friendly and no trouble is expected.

At SAGA, a French Catholic Missionary, after 51 years in this country, has declared the American Occuvation is the best that has ever come to JAPAN. He and several other missionaries were released following the surrender after 4 months of internment. His particular offense was exnressing the oninion that नUSSIA would soon enter the war, that Koreans would some day be free to return to KOREA, and that the U. S. would win the war. He stated thore was no underground movement against the occupation and informed us he knew who was responsible for his insifisnnment but would not reveal their identity as it would imperil the future of his mission.

Mr. HARA, Fumio, Assistant Managing Director of the SAIKAI Manufacturing Co., Ltd, SASEBO, makers of ballast, bilge, centrifugal, ash ejector, and fresh water pumps, has been interviewed. His factory \#1 is located on the HIU Whar: about a mile from the HIU Fin station. It occuvies $j 03$, 000 sq ft , is now shut down, but soon plans to turn out irrigation and marine pumns. Factory \#2
 and Factory \#3 consists of $61,200 \mathrm{sq} \mathrm{ft} \mathrm{about} 6 \mathrm{miles}$ from the KARATSU RR Station.

Mr. NAKASHIMA, Touemon, director of the Iron Works
of the same name, states his minnt in ONO, (Moved from SASEBO), manufactured nothing but two-cycle semi- $D_{i=s e l}$ engines before and during the war. Due to shortage of material, only repair work is now possible for the 35 employees.
: When asked to state their opinion of Mayor KOURA, Sokei, of SASEBO, a nolitician, two bankers, an industrial--ist were against him, primarily for his militaristic - associations and connections with the Police Department. A newsmar ara a teacher merely stated "The Mayor is

- Dopular w': the people" . A reporter, a close friend
- of Mayor KOURA, believed he would never again be Mayor
- bocause the politicians do not like him and a DOMEI News
agency representative termed him selfish, narrow, and oblivious to the welfare of the citizenry.

An interview with a likely candidate for Meyor of SASEBO, Mr. NAKATA, M sasuke, age 55, WASEDA College (TOKYO) ' 08 , Vice-nresident of NAGASAKI Prefecture Agricultural Association, raveals that he felt government had not givan required sunnort to fermers but in spite of this fact, they, including NAKATA himself, backed the - war effort. War was a nocessity, $h$ s said, due to oroblems - of a huga po oulation and lack of a source of raw materials. The Japanese neonle as a whole, reflected the government's policy of waging war. Their's was a nenresentative form of government even though freedom of expression was denied, he mointrined. Now that the war is lost, he will do all he can to cpoperate with American Forces although he nor the reat of the neonle do not know the Americens yet. He claims ho att minted to stamp out rumors that Americans would rave, loot, and viunder unon their arrival.

Further information on Mr . Horace NUTTER, British National, age 75 (Periodic Ronort No. 23, 14 October) disclosed in an interview by Cantain C. A. PEAFSON, USMCR, of CT-2S, reveals that Mr. NUTMER was born in GREENFORD, MIDDLESEX, ENGLAND, 12 May, 1870. At the age of 27 , he left GREAT BRITAIN, travalied in the U. S. for two years, and then, in 1899, came to JAPAN whore he jarticipated. in the import-export business until 1940 when ho retired because he was continuelily being undercut by the Japanese, His notice to the nublic, however, stated he was closing for lack of office assistance. Mr. NUTTER is married to a Jananese born women who has also become a British subjoct. (As of 170 ct 45 , Mrs. NUTTER was critically ill, and not exnected to survive more than a few hours).

On 9 December, 1941, local nolice confined the NUTTERS to their home in KARATSU until $\Re_{6}$ July, 1945, when they were ordered to a detention camb by the then Chief of KARATSU Police, NOMOURA, Hajiine.

The place of detention was the hotel at KIYOMIZU, otherwise known as SHIMIZU, (see Miscellaneous), north of OGI, nean SAGA. They were not mistreated; However, rations nere poor, Freedom came on 6 Septamber and they, lixe the other prisoners, roturned to their home. The folio ing list of foreign refugees, interned at KIYOMIZU was submitted by NUTTER: (This Division is in receint of a similar roster from Edward ZILLIG (see Miscellaneous) ex-U.S. Marine).

A patrol from the SAGA Occu:ation Groun, operating north of OGI has located an internment camp at SHIMIZU. Inmates had been billeted in about 50 small dwellings. The only remaining ex-internee is Edward ZILIIG,

(Periodic kenort 23, l40ctl945) an ex-U. S. Marine, who expressed a desire to $r$ main in the cami area. ZILIIG stated the treatment had not been harsh but the food hed been insufficient. He submitted a list of jersons detained at the camp which corresmonded to that received from Horace NUTTER (see Civilian Ponulation).

ZILLIG turned over the following items to the patrol:
(I) A statement of the kind service received by the inte inees from Police Sergeant Kaibara YOSHINO, in c.arge of OGI MACHI Police Station; and AINOURA HARUO, formerly in charge of the camp, now on duty in SAGA City.
(2) A request for renewal of his $\$ 60.00$ ner month nension.

Japanese Army, Navy, and civilian personnel from HATAKA on DAITO SHIMA debarked from a Jap minesweeper, the HABUSHI MARU, \#198 at URAGASHIRA, about 9,000 yards SE of SASEBO, commencing at 1030 this morning. Processing went on in an orderly fashion and the Japanese were coonerative. They were well clothed but bossessed. excess amounts of food, princinally sugar which was ordered turned over to local Jananese authority for rationing.

Included in those landed wore 8 meteorologists, ? women, and 1 male, in charge of the women; these were all civilians. The women are prostitutes, and two of them are pregnant.

It was later learned that the man in charge of these prostitutes is carrying 22,000 yen. The l3th Marines, in charge of the processing, reports this man ran a hotel and had bought the 7 girls for service therein. With their earnings they are now attemnting to buy back their freedom.
