SUBJECT: A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE CAMPS IN THE OSAKA SYSTEM FROM MEMORY. by R. Miller Brown, 3rd Officer, British Merchant Navy.

The Japanese number the Camps in the following arbitrary manner, these camps numbered with Roman system and those numbered with Japanese Numbers - the Japanese are here reproduced by ordinary numbers :-

> Hiroheta VII - Kamioke X - Taisho 2. Umeda 3. Yodogawa 4. Sakurajima XII - Osyama 6. Amagasaki XIII - Tsumori 7. Harima XIX - Ikune XVII - Wakayama 8. Wakinohama Nemie Headquarters Camp was grouped with the Hosp-

- It is hard to remember the exact dates of the formation of the various camps, but the system was opened by the establishment about October of 1942 a Camp in the site celled "Itchioka S Stadium" and the personnel who made up this camp came from Zentsuji, being entirely enlisted men with an American Medical Officer who later returned to Zentisuji. About the end of October, this camp was split three ways, approximately 60 men of the original total of around 180 going to make up the nucleus of Headquarters Hiroheta and Umeda - the first three Camps in the Area.
- About this time the British from the "Lisbon Maru" were brought in and formed part of the headquarters camp and and Kobe Camp. Later in November, drafts from the Philippines arrived, and provided the personnel to make up Umeda and Headquarters and also to form the new camp called Yodogawa. During this period of times there were various small drafts of men who were sent into Kobe and Headquarters Camps. These drafts consisted mainly of Merchant Seamon captured by the Germans and handed over to the Japanese at Yokohama.
- Early in 1943 more personnel arrived from Hong Kong to form the Sakurajima and Amagasaki Camps, and drafts from Java and Singapore consisting meinly at Dutchmen and Australians formed the Camps

of Kawasaki, Kamioka, Harima and Taisho. In the early Summer of this year, personnel arrived from Hong Kong and formed the Marumi and Osyama Cemps. Somewhere about this time a draft of Service and Civilians arrived from Wake Is. via Shanghai and formed Tsumori Camp, they were later followed in that Camp by a further draft of Dutch from Java, and British from Singapore.

- being mainly British service personnel from Java and Singapore; Iruka, Funatsu and Yokaichi also came into being about this time with assorted personnel from Singapore, and also some of the last drafts from Philippines. Later in the same year Wakinohama and marue Camps were established with personnel from the Philippines Islands and a few assorted P.O.W. from other places.
- From April 1945, the ststem underwent a radical change.

 Five Camps were transferred bodily to the Magoya system, namely,
 Kamicka, Iruka, Yakaichi, Harima and Funatsu. Later the remaining
 Camps in the area were all split up with the exception of Kobe and
 Headquarters, both of which underwent fairly extensive changes of
 personnel. The Camps that broke up had their personnel scattered
 in a most confused manner, only Wakayama Camp being more or less
 directly transferred to a new camp at Ikune. The other Camps
 were formed into Tsuruga, Noda, Takefu, Notogawa, and Maibara,
 with a certain amount of transferring the Magoya, Niroshima, Fukuoka
 and Tokyo arears. This brought the number of P.O.W. in the area
 down from 10,700 to about 4,200 and shook up all the original Camps,
 mixing nationalities and services more than ever before. It would
 appear that all this shifting around was done largely to create
 confusion, and certainly not to remove prisoners from the bombed or
 target areas.
- The last thing done in the area was to establish a Camp at Rokuroshi for Officer personnel of Zentsuji, this was done in early July 1945.

Summary of the transfer of the OSAKA PW Internment Sub-Camp (BUNSHO) No. 2 (formerly Sub-Camp No. 1) due to war damage.

I. General Facts

The destruction by fire of this Sub-Camp No. 1 (KOBE) and its infirmary due to bombing of the OSAKA-KOBE area on 1st and 5th June is truly regrettable. This Sub-Camp and the infirmary attached to Sub-Camp No. 1 (KOBE) were temporarily moved to the former Sub-Camp No. 13 (TSUMORI) and to the former Detached Camp (HAKENSHO) No. 5 (KAWASAKI) respectively. Since then, Sub-Camp No. 1 was moved on 21 June to the former Sub-Camp No. 18 (WAKI NO HAMA).

NOTE: The location of the former Detached Camp No. 5 is KOBE-Shi, HAYASHIDA-Ku, MARUYAMA-Machi, 2-Chome, 1.

Mr. MURAI (an ex-Lt in the Army) of the Company Labor Dept., had charge of the POW's at work. The company supplied civilians who were bosses of POW's at work. These bosses were called "Hanchos" (section leader). Two systems of POW labor: first, "CHCKUYEI", POW's worked directly for the mill; second, "OKAUE", contractors working for the mill used POW labor.

- Q. List the hospitals that were established in the Osaka Area for use by the POW's. Give details in full.
- A. The hospitals were as follows:

ICHIOKA HOSFITAL WARD:

Metablished: 18 October 1942. Used until: 10 July 1944.

NOTE: In August 1942, 80 POW's were brought to Ichicka Playground.

At that time Ichicka was under jurisdiction of Jentsuji POW Camp.

On 18 October 1942 the POW's were transferred to Hirohata Camp.

After this date Ichicka was used as a hospital.

Location: In Osaka, under grandstand at the Ichioka Athletic Field.

Commander: Col. MURATA was head, various medical officers in direct supervision.

Patients: Never more than 100, came from the various camps in the Osaka Area. Cases usually sent here that required more than 2 or 3 days confinement.

On 10 July 1944 this hospital was transferred to Kobe to the following address: Kumochi-cho, Fuhiai-Ku, Kobe. This transfer was made because Ichioka was thought to be lacking in proper facilities. The medical commander at this time was lat Lt. HYMJIRO OHASHI. The hospital at this time was known as Kumochi-cho Hospital Ward or Kobe Hospital On 5 June 1945 this hospital was bombed. The patients and personnel were then moved to Maruyama (Kawasaki) POW Camp (known also as Kobe Hospital here) and remained there until the end of the war. Lt. OHASHI was in command all of that time.

KOBE HOSPITAL:

This is synonymous with Eumochi-cho Hospital Ward. (See above)

OSAKA STADIUM:

This probably was the same as Ichioka Hospital Ward. The Ichioka Ward was located in Osaka under the stadium at the Ichioka Athletic Field.

OSAKA MILITARY BOSFICAL:

This is an old established Japanese Hospital. When the accommodations at Ichioka proved insufficient, some patients were brought here.

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Used for POW's from November 1942 until June 1943.

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KAYASAKI HOUPITALI TE MEGATE ME ANIE MEAN DE ME DESMENDE LES

This hospital is a part of the Hawasaki Heavy Industries and was not set up solely for the use of the POW's. Prisoners were brought here from time to time for special treatment. He other facts available.

RED CROSS BOSPITAL (UEHERMACHI):

This hospital was established for prisoners use on 38 August 1945.

Q. Why was the hospital established at such a late date? A. To make the conditions of the prisoners look better.

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- Q. In looking over the list of Frisoner of War Camps, we see some are referred to as "Bunsho" and others as "Hakensho". What is the difference between the two?
- A. A "Bunsho" means the camp was fed, clothed, administrated and supervised directly by the army. A "Hakensho" means that the company the prisoners worked for would provide the food, do the administration, provide guards, etc. The army would merely supervise. The Company would be responsible for the welfare of the prisoners.

The original plan was to make all the camps into "Hakensho", eight were made when the army found that the plan was not feasible, so the attempt was abandoned.

The eight camps are shown in the list at the beginning of this statement.
