P-51 pilot died. He had internal injuries and when he would eat his food would pass right out. It would not stey in his stomach, and he slowly went crazy and finally beat his head out against the wall and the next morning he died. I know of that, Whenever he caused any trouble, the Jap zuards went into his call and beat him with the butt of their rifles.

Q. Did you know any of the guards that did this?

No. That fellow on Omori, a no good guy, they called him "Glass Eye". Another of the guards was called "Pudding Head". I understand from the other fellows that "Laughing Boy" Nishida administered beatings. It was also said that Watanabe administered punishment.

Mr. Stanley A. Roese of the Prosecution Division is preparing Case #150 for trial. He has in his possession a photographic copy of the above sworn statement by Lt(jg) Herbert L. Law.

On 4 February 1947, Mr. Stenley A. Reese interrogated Takao MORI, former interpreter and Sgt Maj in the Osaka Kempel Tai Headquarters, who witnessed the execution of 2nd Lt Robert W. Nelson and S/Sgt Algy S. Augunas (Auganus). Although Takao MORI made a sworn statement, he lied when he described the scene of the execution. Takao MORI stated that 2nd Lt Nelson and S/Sgt Augunas (Auganus) were shot, however, a sworn statement made by Kenzo MAGAO on 18 March 1947 and contained 12 Report #150, dated 27 March 1947, describes how the two (2) fliers were beheaded. Takao MORI's sworn statement is as follows:

I, Takso MORI, after having been duly sworn, testified at Sugamo Prison, Tokyo, Japan, on the 4th day of February as follows:

- Q. After the Court was opened who made the first statement, or asked the first question?
- A. Major YAMANAKA. He said for these two men, the crew of the B-29, the trial will now begin. Major YAMANAKA asked Lt. NELSON for his name, rank, age, organization and next asked Sgt. AUCANUS the same questions.

Lieutenant OGIYA made the short statement (prosecutor). These two men of the crew of the B-29 have bombed the cities of Japan, such as Tokyo, Hamspatsu, Osaka and Kobe since December 1944 until March 17, 1945, so they are to be tried on this doed.

Q. Did Lt. OGTYA tell AUGANUS or NELSON that they were being tried for indiscriminate bombing of civilians?

- . He did not mention the word "indiscriminate" bombing, but only said bombing and caused death and injuries to civilians, except for telling them that they were being tried for the bombing of cities in Japan.
- e. Except for telling them that they were being tried for the bombing of cities in Japan, did he tell them of the details of charges against them, or that they were being tried for the death sentence?
- They are to be tried on the charges of bombing, he said. He did not mention that they should be tried for indiscripinate bombing or that the death sentence was involved, and didn't use these words.
- Q. Was that all that Lieut. Ogiya said in his statement?
- A. Yes, his statement was very short.
- Q. Then what happened?

- documents made by Liquitenant Ogiya and the other documents made at the MP station. As the questions were being asked I and Captain One turn the pages.

  Q. Now, I want you to tell me, in your own words, just what questions Captain ONO asked and what the answers

  He came to Saipon in September or November 1944 as a
  member of the crew of a B-29
- Then Captain ONO asked the same question of Sgt AUGANUS and he answered that he was born in the states and then he went to school there and then entered the army and then came to Saipan about the same time as Lt. Nelson as a crew of a B-29. The name of the place and the name of the school, I do not remember. He asked Lt. NELSON first and then asked the same

questions to Sgt. AUGANUS before he questioned NELSON alone.

- Q. What did ONO do next?
  - He asked if they were both members of the same crew and did they know each other. Both of them answered yes.

Then Captain ONO asked NELSON how many times had he been in on bombings of Japan since he came to Saipan until captured, and he answered about ten times. Then he asked the same question to AUGANUS and AUGANUS also answered about ten times.

Then Captain ONO asked NELSON what his work on the crew was when he joined the bombing of Japan and he answered, "I am a navigator."

Captain ONO asked, "Phat is a navigator?" "Will you show me what kind of work this is?" Lt. NELSON answered: "As a navigator I use radar equipment; navigation maps, and lead the plane straight to the bombing target." That was his duty or work.

Captain ONO repeated the same question to AUGANUS and AUGANUS answered, "I am a radio operator. As a radio operator I communicated with the base in an emergency. Hy other work was giving first aid to crew members."

Then Captain ONO proceeded to the question of bombing. Chiefly asked questions to Lt. NELSON. Did you actually join the bombing of cities in Japan from December until February, using high explosive bombs?

NELSON answered, "I did, as I already have told you (meaning both the MP investigation and documents made by Lieut. Ogiya.)"

Captain ONO pointed out certain cities from documents before him. Then Captain ONO asked if the targets were definite targets or not, and Lt. NELSON answered that they had bombed definite targets, such as aircraft factories, arsenals, etc.

Captain ONO asked, "Did you actually join in bombing over Osaka and Kobe in March?"

NELSON answered, "Yes."

C. When you joined the bombing, how many planes were there at Osaka and Kobe?

NELSON answered, "Between one hundred and one hundred fifty planes in groups at both places."

Q. What was the time of the bombings, when they started and when they reached the cities?

NELSON answered that they left after supper and reached both cities about midnight. Osaka was bombed first and the day after the next day Kobe was bombed. As to the types of bombs, NELSON answered, "I didn't see them loaded, but I was told they were incendiary bombs."

Captain Ono's next question: . "When you came over to these cities, how did you know and what did you see?

NELSON answered, "We use radar in navigating and through radar scope use we obtain site of the city in checking with maps, and when I came over these two cities our plane west usually in the middle of the group and usually there were planes shead of us. Over cities there are clouds and I cannot see the ground; by my eyes, but there were fires reflected against the clouds." NELSON stated, "We ... usually fly straight course we are given when we leave from the base." C. When your plane came over the city, what did you do? By Capt. Ono In checking up the site of the city and noticing that the plane was just over the city, I informed the Commander of the plane to that effect. Then our plane flew over the city, according to the course. Q. Captain ONO - Did you know actually that the plane dropped bombs over the cities? Nelson answered that he was told that bombs were A. dropped. Q. Did you know about the target? Was there some definite targe: at that time? He did not know the definite target. When we left at the briefing I was told just the center of the city was the bargot. That is all. bargot. Q. Were there any other questions asked Lt. NELSON by Capt. ONO? A. Yes, he asked Lt. NELSON if the statements he made and were written down in the investigation were true. Lt. NELSON answered that these statements were written as I told them and so I signed on them. Did Capt. One have any statements that NELSON had made read to him during the trial? A. No, he didn't, Q. Were you asked at any time during the trial to translate to Lt. NELSON anything taken from the statements he made during the investigation? A. No.

- A. I didn't see any fires myself, but I was told that the city was on fire when the plane came over the city. That is all, I think.
- Q. Did ONO ask the radio operator if he attended the briefing before leaving on the mission?
- A. No, he didn't.
- Q. Did Coptain ONO ask AUGANUS if he knew anything at all about where they were going to bomb in Japan?
- A. Yes, and AUGANUS said that he heard some other members; of the crew say that they were going to Osaka or Kobe, but he didn't know anything about targets, or what they would homb.

A: Yes; he was told by the crew that they were carrying incendiary bombs.

Q. Can you think of any other questions: which Captain ONO asked Sgt. AUGANUS?

Did ONO ask AUGANUS if they knew what kind of bombs
